## GET FRANCHISE

### STEIDL & TWEET TO LAY WATER MAINS.

Whole-sale Liquor Ordinance Read For First Time—Squabble Over Appointment of Policeman—Dr. Ferrell, Health Officer.

Without discussion and by a unanimous vote, the Common Council last night granted a water franchise for Lytle Addition to Steidl & Tweet. After the ordinance was read the second time, the Council decided to vote on it at once, resulting in its passage.

An ordinance providing for the licensing and regulation of whole-sale liquor houses, and defining what is a whole-sale liquor business, was read the first time. The license fee is placed at \$250 per annum and a \$500 bond is required. Violation of the ordinance is punishable by a \$50 fine or 20 days in jail, or by both.

During the council session street grading work was discussed but no definite action taken. D. D. France, formerly of Beal & Co. of Portland, was present and was asked to address the Council on the matter. He made a proposition to grade Wall, Bond and cross streets, 60 feet wide, for \$1.00 a linear foot, the city to furnish the engineer, the contractor to provide everything else and put down a 12-inch layer of loose stone. It was reported to the Council that the petition for grading Wall Street had been signed by all but three property owners, the signers agreeing to pay 80 cents a front foot for the improvement and the city the remainder. An effort will be made by those circulating the petition to get the other three to sign up also so that the work can be undertaken.

The street sprinkling problem was taken up and the street committee instructed to investigate and report at the next meeting.

Bend's present dog nuisance also received attention and it was decided to rigidly enforce the dog ordinance, was postponed.

The city attorney was ordered to draw up a new ordinance amending the present flag and chimney law, which is considered too strict.

Sidewalks were ordered laid on the south side of Kentucky Street in front of lot 10, block 10, and on the east side of Front Street in front of lots 1 to 5, inclusive, block 22.

The charter committee reported that it had made a start on the work assigned it.

Charles W. Myers, formerly a Seattle policeman under the Wappenstein regime, it is understood, applied for appointment as a Bend officer, and Mayor Coe asked that he be given a month's trial. Councilman Sellars vigorously opposed the appointment, and the Council failed to confirm it. The Mayor, after adjournment, appointed Myers to serve till the next Council meeting.

## FIRE

For the present the Chemical Fire Engine will be kept at Aune's Livery Barn on Bond Street.

S. E. Roberts was unanimously appointed regular day policeman. On motion of Allen the pay of policemen was placed at \$100 a month. It was ordered by the Council that the tree in the street in front of the Opera House be removed today.

Dr. B. Ferrell was unanimously appointed city health officer. The annual salary of the position is figured at one and one-half cents per inhabitant of Bend, or a \$10 minimum.

## COMPANY ORGANIZES

### New Concern Will Handle Builders' Supplies and Plaster.

Articles of incorporation of the Overturf-Davis-Miller Co., with a capitalization of \$10,000, were filed with the County Clerk at Prineville last week. The officers of the new company are H. J. Overturf, President; D. M. Davis, Vice-President; and H. A. Miller, Secretary and Treasurer.

The new company will carry a full line of builders' supplies. A carload of lime, cement and pulp plaster is now being freighted in. Pulp plaster is used without sand, so will fill a long-felt want here.

Negotiations are now being concluded for a warehouse site along the railroad right-of-way. For the present the office of the company will be at Mr. Overturf's office on Wall Street.

## FINAL TRANSFER MADE MONDAY

### Bend Company Now at Helm---Big Mills Assured---Activity Commences Immediately.

"All the timber belonging to the Brooks-Scanlon, the Scanlon-Gipson and the Brooks-Robertson companies will be milled at Bend."—Dr. D. F. Brooks.

"When the Christian Mueller Land and Timber Company manufactures its timber it will be at Bend."—Clyde McKay. The old P. B. D. Co. mill will be put in operation at once.

At six P. M. Monday the final transfer of the Bend Townsite and affiliated interests from the old townsite company to the newly organized Bend Company occurred. At that time payment was made to A. M. Drake and Frank Robertson and all details of the transfer closed.

The officers of the new company are: D. F. Brooks, President; Clyde McKay, Vice President; A. O. Hunter, Treasurer; Ralph Averill, of Minneapolis, Secretary, and J. M. Lawrence, General Manager.

With the consummation of the transfer the Bend Townsite Company passes out of existence, as does the Pilot Butte Development Co. The Bend Water, Light & Power Company retains its identity. Its new officers are: D. F. Brooks, Pres.; Clyde McKay, Vice Pres.; Ross Averill, Sec.-Treas.; D. F. Brooks, H. C. Gipson, A. O. Hunter, J. M. Lawrence and Clyde McKay are directors.

Leaving Portland Monday morning Clyde McKay, with his wife and two children, and D. L. McKay, arrived last night.

"When the Christian Mueller Land and Timber Company saws it will be here," said Mr. McKay in an interview this morning. The holdings of this company embrace some 700,000,000 feet of timber, from 5 to 24 miles from town. Last week was published a similar statement from Dr. D. F. Brooks, of the Scanlon-Gipson and affiliated companies, affecting more than 600,000,000. This place is also the logical milling point for the holdings of the Rogers Lumber Co., including about 700,000,000 feet. The probabilities are that these three mills would average an annual cut of about 125,000,000 feet. In the neighborhood of 125 men would be employed in each mill, and 200 in the woods. For the three this would mean over 1000 men. This figure, which those familiar with the work declare conservative, of course does not include the force of the smaller establishments which inevitably will operate, nor that of the box, sash and door factories, etc. The annual pay roll of each establishment will be approximately \$120,000.

Mr. McKay stated that the old Pilot Butte Development Company's saw mill will be opened Monday. Budd Morrison, who has been in the employ of the Mueller Lumber Co. at their Davenport, Iowa, mill, as assistant foreman, will be mill foreman. Mr. Morrison is expected in this week.

At the outset it is expected the daily cut will be about 30,000 feet. Once logging has been got under way night and day shifts will be run. It is the intention of the company to get probably 4,000,000 feet of lumber on hand in the yard. Robert Hodgins, from Chippewa Falls, Wis., will be wood superintendent.

Probably about 40 men will be employed at first. When the day-and-night work is commenced this number will be increased to 65 or 70. The new company has 3420 acres of timber, or about 35,000,000 feet, from one to five miles distant from the mill. Much new mill equipment has been purchased, including steam "nigger", siding saw and logging equipment. A number of teams will be purchased. Later it is expected to install a band saw.

Tonight A. O. Hunter arrives. With him is Harry Douglas, of Detroit, Mich. The other members of the new organization are expected in Friday.

## OREGON CENSUS FIGURES LIGHT. KEEP CLEAR OF FISH LADDER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—The Census Bureau has just issued the following population figures of the following Central Oregon towns, as compiled by the enumerators: Bend 536, Prineville 1042, Madras 364, Rosland 126, Laidlaw 49, Burns 904, Klamath Falls 2758, Lakeview 1253, Vale 396.

Hereafter Bend folks will have to go further when they want fish for breakfast. Section 4085 of Bellinger and Cotton's Code states that it is unlawful for anyone to fish within 600 feet of any fish ladder on any stream in Oregon. The local deputy fish warden has requested the publication of this interesting information.

## SHAPING UP ROAD

### CREW AT WORK ON ROUTE TO BURNS.

Sagebrush and All Rocks Will Be Removed—Party of Autoists to Try It Out on Trip to Harney County Seat on April 23rd.

Armed with grub hoes, picks, powder and other road-making equipment, a crew of six men started out from Bend Monday morning to put the new Bend-Burns road in tip-top shape for travel. All the sagebrush and rocks will be removed clear through to the Harney County line. This work will be completed, it is expected, by April 23, when a party of Bend men, in eight or ten automobiles, will leave here to make a trip over the highway to Burns.

The road gang, headed by Supervisor E. W. Richardson, which left Bend on March 27 to go over the route with a drag, returned last Thursday. The heavy machine was pulled over the route twice and removed much of the sage brush. But, according to homesteaders in town this week who have been over the road, this drag did not leave the new highway in a condition fit for traveling, some of them going so far as to say they could barely find the way at some places.

The party that started to work Monday consists of Mr. Richardson, a cook and four laborers. Two wagons to haul provisions, feed, tools, etc., are taken along, with only one team, however, which will be sufficient to move the wagons along as the workmen advance. An average of six or seven miles a day will be made, it is believed, and the entire route gone over in two weeks. Homesteaders who subscribed labor on the road will be asked to assist the party as it goes out.

Bend business men have been very liberal in their contributions and, with the money which the county has given, there will be ample funds to carry out this important road-building project.

The autoists who will leave here a week from Sunday will go through to Burns and formally inform the people of that town of the new road being opened and invite them to begin using it for freighting and auto travel. By May 1 a large number of teams will likely be going over the new route.

## BUYS BULLETIN PRESS.
