Make Great Northern Exhibit Effective Advertisement

The possibilities of Oregon both as an agricultural and fruit state are being played up strongly by the Great Northern Railway at their Exhibit in Columbus, Ohio, and the following extract of article taken from the Columbus Journal gives some idea of the beauty of and interest created by this Exhibit.

The exhibition is well worth the visit. Great sheaves of golden wheat, oats and other grains adorn the walls in artistic array. Big crystal jars display the fruits of the far west. Literature descriptive of the wonderful opportunities awaiting the homeseeker are distributed.

"The Great Northern Railway has not a foot of land to sell," said L. O. Stout, who is in charge of the display. "President Hill wants the men and women of your city to realize the great possibilities of the big, new west."

Mr. Stout has many large photographs of orchard scenes along the railroad and in the adjacent territory which tell in forcible language the story of the fertile west.

As a proof that the apple industry is a great source of revenue in the western country, the fruit growers have sent gorgeous glowing fruits to the exhibition.

Files and crates of apples, such as one seldom sees, grace the tables and counters at the exhibition.

Vegetables, too, of great size, are displayed.

Beautiful flowers from Oregon, cunningly preserved, add to the beauty of the display.

MILLICAN ON MAP

POSTOFFICE GRANTED,
SERVICE STARTS.

Mail Will Be Routed From Bend to this and Whittaker, Second New Office Established in Homestead Country.

MILLICAN, Ore., April 11.—Mrs. Mabel C. Tozier, postmaster of the recently created postoffice of Millican, has just received her commission and opened the office. The homesteaders in this valley are already having their mail addressed to this office and in a short time it is expected that a large patronage will be served. Uncle Sam does not require a regular carrier service for the first three months, but it is the intention of the postmaster to have the mail brought out from and sent in to Bend several times a week.

The petition of settlers in Whittaker Valley, sent to Washington some time ago asking for an office to be called Whittaker, with Mrs. Thomas Gray as postmaster, has been granted, giving another new postoffice in the country. This office will be about ten miles from Millican and will be opened within the next few weeks.

KEEP OUT OF RUTS.

In That Way Motorists Will Make Highways Better.

Few problems with which the motorist has to cope have proved more refractory than that of improving the roads. It is so unwieldy a situation to handle and its ramifications extend into such a multitude of tangles in the field of legislation and of public sentiment that progress has now been slow indeed. None the less it is possible for each automobile owner here and now to give practical assistance to the movement if he only will.

Those who have carefully studied the road maintenance problem find that one of their chief difficulties arises from the fact that traffic inevitably finds its way into a pair of ruts. Each succeeding vehicle digs deeper, and so the operation continues until there is only one part of the road which can be traveled with comfort. Suppose that each vehicle should seek a new path. What would be the result? A smooth, firmly packed surface, in practically as good condition as if a steam roller were in constant operation. Now is the time when a policy of avoiding the ruts can best be made effective.
