HAS RIGHT START

PORTLAND PAPER PRAISES BEND.

Oregon Journal, in Editorial Columns, Has Much to Say Concerning This Town's Development.— Bend Appropriately Named.

Under the caption "The Development of Bend," the Oregon Journal of Portland, in its issue of April 26, makes the following editorial comment upon this town:

If ever an infant town was appropriately named Bend is that place. Just where the S bend of the river suggests the sites for factories and industries and residences—there Bend is placed.

No one looked over the future townsite without conviction that some day or other men would be found who could not only forecast the certain future of the place but had courage enough to act, to realize the common prophecy. However favorable the site it was a great undertaking to create the town, to inspire faith in the men needed to harness the water power, to clear the sage brush levels, to bring in lumber mills and industries of construction, to open roads and trails, to build houses and schools and churches, to irrigate gardens and farms.

All needed to be done on faith, since without railroads to connect the rising town with the outside world immigration would languish, industries, if started, would die for want of support, dreams could never become realities. Railroads there were none in sight—just paper roads and printed promises.

It seemed as if hope must lose its nourishing power, and there was nothing to sustain it until the mighty force of competition in big affairs came into play and two railroads, instead of one, sprang into active life.

Now the railroad is in sight. Woolen mills and lumber mills are provided for, as is announced, and other industries are certain to be brought.

The same spirit that a year or two ago boded the infant town to establish a high school and founded a library can be trusted to give solid foundations for the development that is to be. Bend started right, and now the road is cleared for her rapid growth in all that makes a successful city.

ATE A WHOLE SHEEP.

One of the Feats of Nicholas Wood, a Famous Glutton.

The following account of a man named Nicholas Wood, famed for his gluttony, was written by John Taylor, the "water poet" of the seventeenth century:
