SUMMER BASEBALL SEASON OPENED

Bend's 1911 baseball team made its first appearance on the diamond Sunday afternoon and celebrated by winning over Sisters by a score of 15 to 4. They gave every indication that during the summer the local fans will be treated to some real baseball.

The feature of the game was the slugging of the Bend Reds. They beat the ball to all parts of the grounds and made their hits count by good base running. Vanlandingham was the star with the willow, driving out four hits. He also made some sensational plays at short. Brownlow got three safe hits.

Although it was the first time the nine men had appeared on the diamond together, they showed considerable team work and with a little more practice should be a strong aggregation.

Reinsdorff, a recent comer to Bend from Seattle, made a fine impression on the fans as a pitcher. He has plenty of speed, in fact so much that he gave Brownlow plenty of work to hold him.
