### THIEVES RANSACK HOMESTEAD CABIN

For Second Time in Three Months, Mrs. Busey's House is Broken Into—Picnickers Spend Fourth at Ice Cave Near Bend.

MILLIGAN, July 8.—For the second time within three months, the homestead cabin of Mrs. Ella Busey has been broken into and ransacked. While she was here this week visiting her sister, Mrs. Ada B. Millican, who has been ill for the past six weeks, thieves entered Mrs. Busey's home by breaking out the window and stole nearly all the provisions she had, including a large stock of canned fruit. It is believed that it was the work of the same persons who vandalized the house in the spring.

Ice Cave was the scene of a picnic party on the Fourth when Mr. and Mrs. George Millican, Miss Martha Good, Mrs. Ella Busey and Miss Emily Schreder visited the scenic wonder 15 miles west of here. The caves were explored by several members of the party and a large quantity of ice brought home.

Victor Schreder, who was here Thursday returning from Bend to his home at Rolyat, reported seeing the tracks of an old cougar and two kittens in the road between town and Horse Ridge.
