PLAY IS SUCCESS

HOME TALENT MAKES A BIG HIT.

Large Crowd Enjoys Performance of "Among the Breakers"---All Ten Who Appear in Cast Act Their Parts With Much Credit.

The way the affair was carried out showed that all those having parts must have put in much time and labor to make it the success that it was.

U. N. Hoffman did particularly well as Peter Paragraph, being just suited to the part. Mrs. K. D. McIntosh made a very good Biddy Bane, as she acted so naturally, not overdoing her part as amateurs are so likely to do. As a typical Irishman, W. W. Orcutt was a success in the part of Larry Devine. Mrs. G. W. Shriner as Mother Carey had one of the most difficult roles and acquitted herself with credit. Willard Houston, as Scud, the colored servant, made much merriment. Mrs. George S. Young, as Minnie Daze, the society belle, made quite a hit. She was "indeed romantic." Miss Anne Markel, as Bess Starbright, the little seafaring girl, carried out her role splendidly. Jesse Sumrall showed that he can act the part of a wealthy old man to fine effect. E. M. Lars, in the role of the villain, did, to good effect, what he was expected to do---act villainously. H. J. Eggleston, as Clar-

ence Hunter, a young man, sustained the character represented satisfactorily.

Much of the success of the play was due to the work of Mr. Orcutt, who not only took a part but instructed the others of the cast and managed the production.

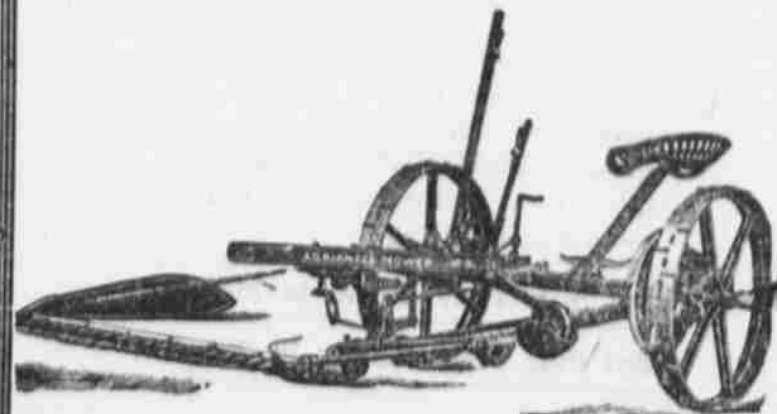
