WEATHER FOR JULY

Maximum Temperature Was 99, Recorded on Sunday, the 16th.

While many of the cities of the Pacific Northwest had some almost unbearably hot weather last month, Bend was more fortunate. The maximum temperature recorded by the United States co-operative observer here was 99 degrees on July 16. Every day in the month was clear. On the 13th at 8 a. m. there was a slight thunder shower, the precipitation being recorded only as a trace. The following is the report of the month:

FINE CLOVER CROP

W. H. Staats, whose hay shows local possibilities, goes to sea-shore.

The possibilities of the Bend country for clover growing are well demonstrated this year by the success of W. H. Staats. Mr. Staats, from 15 acres of clover immediately adjacent to Bend on the southeast, has cut 40 tons.

"I expect to get 1 1/2 tons to the acre on the second cutting, too," said Mr. Staats. The clover was planted two years ago.

Next Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Staats start for Newport in their auto, Prince Staats driving. Guy McReynolds will accompany them. They will make the 225-mile trip over the Santiam route across the mountains, and expect to be absent about a month.

RUNS FULL BLAST

Lumber Mill Operates to Capacity—70 Men are Employed.

The lumber mill of The Bend Company is operating to its capacity despite reports to the contrary that have received some credence.

"We are sawing about 30,000 feet daily," said General Manager Averill. "While this amount is in excess of the demands of the local trade just at present, it is our intention to accumulate a large and varied stock of thoroughly dry lumber to care for the future market. In the mill, yards and woods we are employing 70 men, all on full time."

WORK ON SOUTH SIDE

Good Progress Being Made on Crooked River Railway Bridge.

Steel is now being put into place on the south side of the Crooked River canyon by the Oregon Trunk, according to word brought by Hugh O'Kane, who was down at the river Friday. He stated that the girders were being taken across the chasm by cable and would not have to be hauled around by wagon as had been reported.

Six spans, each 27 feet long, have now been completed on the north side, and the south side section will be built out to meet that already in place.

BOSSY INJURES LAWNS.

A destructive, stray and inquisitive cow nearly affected a serious set back in Beautiful Bend's lawn

development, desecrating not only A. M. Lara's attractive lawn but the Sabbath as well. The maverick bovine was discovered Sunday evening cropping the Lara lawn, after apparently having been dissatisfied with what she found in the way of supper on the adjoining Putnam place. According to Mrs. Maddock, who discovered the trespasser, an effort to find a police officer to arrest the offender was unavailing. So far as is known, no criminal action was taken against bossy, who escaped unknown and unimpounded. The damage to the two lawns was slight.

FAST TRANS-CASCADE RUN

A record auto run was made by Horace N. Steele Thursday across the Cascades by the Santiam route with seven passengers. From here to Albany, a distance of 133 miles over rough and precipitous roads, he made the trip in 15 hours. In the car were L. B. Baird, wife and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Masters of Bartlesville, Okla., and Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Baird of Newberg.
