**BISHOP ON TOUR**  
REV. R. E. PADDOCK  
HERE SEVERAL DAYS  
Services Held Twice Sunday in Masonic Hall—Discusses With Guild Matter of Building Hall in Bend

The Rev. Robert E. Paddock, of the Episcopal Church, arrived Saturday, leaving today for the north, after conducting services and meetings. While here he was a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Lara.  
On Sunday morning and evening services were held at the Masonic Hall, through the courtesy of that organization. On Monday afternoon a Guild meeting was held on Mrs. C. M. Redfield's lawn. In the evening occurred the meeting of the boy scouts at the Lara home, reported elsewhere in this paper. Last night, at the Hudson house, the Bishop delivered an informal talk upon his experiences in the slums of New York. There was also singing by those present.

As a result of a meeting of the men's committee that is cooperating with the ladies in the matter of erecting the proposed Episcopal guild hall, it was decided to again postpone work upon the structure, the men being unanimous in the opinion that far more can be accomplished towards getting funds for a suitable building after the arrival of the railroad, when building will be less expensive and better financial conditions will make more generous contributions easy. The committee was practically sure that, probably in April, the amount at present pledged by local subscribers, about \$1000, could be doubled.
