## ROOM IN ATTIC

### MORE SCHOOL FURNITURE BOUGHT

Board Takes Action to Provide Accommodations for Large Attendance Expected—High School to Close At 4 P. M. Instead of 4:30

Additional room required by the Bend school this winter will be obtained by fitting up a room in the attic of the school building. This was decided at a meeting of the School Board Saturday evening, attended by the full board. The contract was let to J. W. Dimick for \$194.50 and the work will be completed by Sept. 10. The room will be about 20x20 feet in dimensions, with an eight-foot ceiling. There will also be a hall in the attic. The High School students will probably use this new room, giving the grade pupils more room down stairs.

Three dozen desks and one dozen rear seats to desks have been ordered by the board.

Prof. Shouse was present at the meeting and recommended that the closing hour of the High School be changed from 3:40 to 4 p. m., and that the afternoon recess period be changed from 2:45 to 2:30. His suggestions were adopted.

The board accepted the contract of Miss Martha Sidner, primary room teacher, at \$70 a month for September and October and \$75 a month for the rest of the year.

Chairman Triplett was instructed by the board to secure a janitor for the school building at from \$40 to \$50 a month.

### Not the Answer He Expected.

### Death in Factory Fires.

The question is often debated as to whether persons who lose their lives by a fire developing with great rapid-

ity undergo extreme physical suffering. An authoritative opinion is expressed by the New York Medical Journal, which says: "Unnecessary anguish of mind has probably been felt by relatives of unfortunate workers killed in factory fires by reflection on the supposedly agonizing pain caused by such a death. Where a great bulk of highly inflammable substances is quickly consumed in a closed space the result is the production of large quantities of carbon monoxide. This gas, it is well known, combines with the haemoglobin of the blood to form a compound that refuses to combine with oxygen. The result is a speedy and probably painless asphyxiation before the flames have had a chance to attack the bodies of the victims."
