GETS 72 RIBBONS
LOCAL SCHOOL SHINES
AT FAIR
Showing Made at Prineville By Bend
is Excellent—Teachers Attend
County Institute—Prof. Shouse
and Miss Sideron Program
Seventy-two ribbons were captured by the Bend school at the fair at Prineville last week. The local exhibit was pronounced by all who saw it as splendid. In some respects it was incomplete, but the general excellence of it made up for this deficiency. The teachers of last session as well as those this year devoted much time and effort to make it a creditable exhibit and were much gratified that so large a number of premiums were brought home.
All the teachers of the Bend district attended the institute held last Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Prof. J. B. Shouse gave a talk on the psychology of reading and Miss Martha Sideron on primary work. Miss Maude Vandevort presided at one session.
The visiting teachers were entertained Wednesday evening by the Ladies' Annex.

WILL NOT PAY FOR SURVEY
Settlers on national forests under the act of June 11, 1906, will no longer have to pay for a survey, as they have had to do in the past on unsurveyed lands, when the claim goes to patent. This relieves many settlers under the act, commonly known as the Forest Homestead Law, from a burdensome expense. This was brought about by an agreement between the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture, whereby surveys made by employes of the forest service will be under the supervision of the surveyor general so that they can be accepted by the General Land Office as final.
LURE OF DANGER.
Tragic Recklessness of a Trio of Fire Fighting Heroes.
Former Chief Croker of New York in the World's Work says that, although the whole fire service is founded on the principle of obedience, it is almost impossible to drag a man from danger when his battle blood is up.
"In 1905," he says, "I lost three good men in a big warehouse fire in Thirtieth street through recklessness inspired by this spirit. The building had been pretty well gutted, and one of the walls was getting shaky. Directly under this wall were three men from an engine company hugging a 'load' of hose, their helmets down over their eyes and playing their water on the flames, which almost singed their faces. I saw their danger—it would have been obvious to any one but these three fight-maddened heroes—and shouted: 'Get back there, men! Get back from that wall!'
"They paid as much attention to me as if they had been stone deaf. I ran over and shoved one after the other back into the street out of danger.
"When you're told to get back, get back," I said. "You obey orders."
"Then I turned my back and hurried to another point of the fire. The wall fell before I had gone ten yards. I looked around for the three men. They were nowhere in sight! The moment my back was turned they had rushed back to play their stream in that place of peril, and when the wall fell it buried them beneath the bricks—dead."
