MORE LAND OPENED

After Jan. 1, 32,900 Acres Will Be
Subject to Homestead Law

Dispatches from Washington an-
nounce that 32,900 acres of unap-
propriated public land in Crook
county, thrown out of the old Des-
chutes reserve July 1, will become
subject to selection under the home-
stead laws on Jan. 1, 1912. The
exact location of the lands is not an-
nounced, but it is understood to be
in the eastern part of the county.

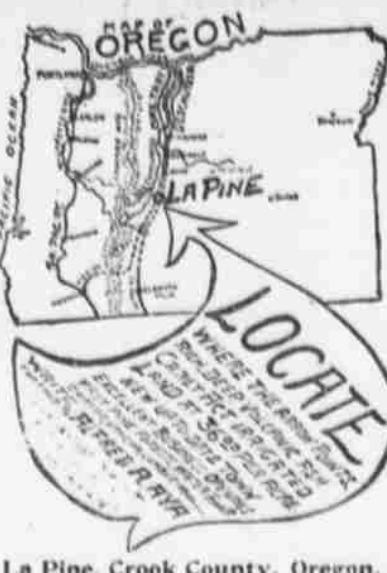
