THE PROPOSED CITY CHARTER

The draft of the city charter proposed by initiative petition filed August 23 and ordained by the Common Council August 31 has been printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the voters. Next Wednesday they will cast their ballots to adopt or reject it.

The charter is a long document and apparently fully covers the field. It makes no radical changes in government from that at present enjoyed by Bend, but does provide enlarged powers which have already been found needed by the council. If adopted, Bend will be able to issue bonds for various purposes, and extensive street improvements can be undertaken if deemed expedient. The council is also empowered to buy or construct and operate water and light systems, as well as sewers. The acquiring of water and light systems may be by "purchase, condemnation or otherwise" of such system "now in existence or that may hereafter be constructed."

The elective officers provided under the charter are a mayor, to be elected annually; six councilmen, three of whom shall be elected each year to serve for a period of two years, and a treasurer, who shall be chosen annually. At the first election under the charter six councilmen shall be chosen, the three receiving the highest number of votes to serve two years and the others one year. The mayor must appoint a recorder and may appoint a chief of police, fire marshal, street commissioner, city attorney, city engineer, city physician, etc. Every appointment must be confirmed by a majority vote of the council.

The charter provides that no salary shall be paid the mayor or councilmen. If adopted next Wednesday, the charter will go into effect from and after midnight of the succeeding day, Thursday.
