
Teaching the Teacher.

The congestion in freight cars on the yard has now been relieved and everything is being handled with dispatch.

The Hill and Harriman officials say they are well pleased with the volume of traffic, both freight and passenger, into Rend.

Agent Corbett has posted notices of the business hours at the depot. They are as follows: Freight, 8 a. m. to 4 p. m.; express, 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.; telegraph, 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. The freight and express offices will be closed on Sunday.

PUTTING IN MAINS

Lytle and Riverside Will Be Receiving Water in Short Time.

Residents of Lytle and Riverside Additions will not have to haul and carry water for domestic use from the Pilot Butte canal and the river much longer. Steidl & Tweet have received piping for their water system in that part of town and it is being installed this week. Within a short time the main will be laid and residences piped ready for water to be turned on.

A mile and a half of pipe has already been laid and is being soaked. The water wheel has been installed and in about ten days the system will be in operation. Every part of the two additions will be supplied. This will necessitate the laying of a main across the Pilot Butte canal.
