**SHIPS TEN CARS HEARD BY MANY**

**STONE GOING TO REDMOND**

**"Dad" West at Present Holds Honors of Being Bend's Biggest Shipper—Contract Will Likely be Filled This Week—Roads to Give Low Rates**

The honor of being the biggest shipper from Bend at present belongs to "Dad" West. Up to today he had shipped out ten carloads. The material is stone for the Redmond depot. It is being quarried west of the river not far from the Bend Co.'s mill and is loaded on cars placed on the flour mill spur. Several four-horse teams have been delivering the rock to the cars in a hurry.

Mr. West is getting \$2 a perch for the rock f. o. b. cars here. This is for the smaller pieces. All dimension stone over five feet long is paid for at the rate of \$5 a piece. Some big blocks of both pink and black stone are being sent down to the neighboring city. The black is used mostly for ornamental purposes. Mr. West says he expects to complete the contract this week. About fifteen carloads will be required for the Redmond station, which will be the same size as the one here.

Low rates on this stone will be given by the railroads, the officials say, and they expect a big tonnage of it from here to various Oregon towns. If the shipments become extensive enough, spur lines will probably be built to the quarries.

Oregon has been invited to occupy several hundred square feet of this space without cost as the St. Paul Association of Commerce has entered into a contract with the league to furnish the display rooms in one of the new buildings of that city rental free, if the league will furnish light and maintain the display. The offer has been accepted.

The plan is simply to show every person who transfers in St. Paul as well as those who visit and live there, a comprehensive exhibit of the products of the Northwest.

**MRS. UNRUH FORCEFUL SPEAKER**

**President of W. C. T. U. in Oregon Delivers Interesting Lectures in Bend—Works for Suffrage on Her Trips as Well as for Temperance.**

Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, president of the Oregon W. C. T. U., who was in Bend Sunday, was heard by a large audience at each service. She spoke morning and evening to the general public, at the Baptist church, and in the afternoon addressed the women.

A woman of strong personality and thoroughly enthusiastic in the cause she represents, she interested all who heard her talks. She showed herself a forceful speaker, holding her auditors with marked attention. She enlivens her addresses with both humor and pathos, and at no time do words fall her. Sunday night she spoke for nearly an hour and a half, holding the attention of the congregation as few other speakers could have done.

Not only does Mrs. Unruh, on her trips, speak against the saloons, gambling and kindred evils, but works in the interest of woman suffrage. She believes, she said, that Oregon will next November give the ballot to the women of the state.

Rt. Rev. C. J. O'Reilly of Baker Conducted Services Sunday.

Bishop C. J. O'Reilly of Baker spent Sunday in Bend. He presided at solemn mass at the Catholic church at 10 a. m., after which he administered the sacrament of confirmation to a class. He lectured at 7:30 p. m. to a large congregation.

It is a complete church on wheels, being fitted out with everything necessary in a large church. During the time it was here several services were held in it.

**Drunkenness in China.**

But, on the other hand, if he is noisy and shows a disposition to quarrel and fight he is at once taken to his rooms and compelled to remain there until the effect of the liquor has worn away.—New York Sun
