**GAIN IS RECORD**

**BEND DISTRICT HAS 377 SCHOOL PUPILS**

Percentage of Increase Over Last Year is 83, Showing that City is Growing With Great Rapidity—Teachers' Examination to be Held Dec. 29.

The rapid growth of Bend during the past year is shown by the school census now being completed by L. D. Wiest, clerk of the School Board. The count, made as Nov. 25, shows at present that there are 377 children between the ages of 4 and 21 years in Bend district No. 12. The gain is 83 per cent over last year, there being 206 enumerated in 1910. This is a record breaker and is greater than expected, although it was known that many new residents had come here.

The apportionment of state and county funds in October gave Bend district No. 12 \$454.13. This amount is available upon receipt and approval of the clerk's bond by the county authorities. The amount of state funds apportioned in October was \$4654.98 and county funds \$4552.83. The fall apportionment is always small compared with the April apportionment. County Supt. Ford says that, when the levy is made in January, he can approximate the amount each district will receive during the current school year. There are now 84 school districts in the county and all the schools well equipped for good work. Many of the teachers are university or normal graduates.

The examination for the certification of teachers will be held at Prineville beginning the third Wednesday in December, the 29th. All teachers holding county permits and those whose certificates will expire next February are required to take this examination.

County superintendents of Oregon are called to meet, by the state superintendent, at Portland Dec. 28-29. Teachers in high schools are requested to meet at the same place and date to give suggestions for a new course of study for high schools.

**WANT TELEPHONE**

**HAMPTON SETTLERS MAY BUILD LINE**

Preliminary Steps to See What Can be Done Taken Last Week—Planned to Have System Connect With This City

Preliminary steps for the construction of a telephone line that will eventually connect with Bend have been taken by the homesteaders in Hampton Valley. At a meeting last Wednesday officers were chosen and a start made. The settlers pledged work and it was decided to see what could be done toward raising funds for purchase of the wire and instruments.

It is proposed at first to connect the homes in the valley and later to extend the line to Bend and to Harney county, or connect with a line reaching these points.

Horace Brookings of Rolyat is in Bend this week in the interests of the project and some of the business men have promised assistance. It is planned to have the main line along the Bend-Burns road, and as the country settles up will be built on to Bend. During the winter the settlers could get out the poles and by next spring probably have the first part of the system constructed. By co-operating with the forestry service lines, poles can be secured from the reserve.

The officers elected last week are: President, A. S. Fogg; vice president, H. C. Miller; secretary, Ronald Conkling; treasurer, Mr. Ikeler. The directors are Horace Brookings, L. C. Peck, Louis Miller, Earl Rogers, Burr Black, W. P. Ireland and Pat Stewart.
