Bend theater-goers are awaiting
with expectancy the arrival of the
Madras Dramatic Co. Friday night
when they will present at the opera
house, the side-splitting one-act
comedy entitled, "A Spinsters' Con-
vention."

The characters in the play are all
prominent Madras people and the
entertainment made a big hit when
they presented it for the first time
in Madras last October. M. E. Me-
loy, editor of the Madras Pioneer,
was here last Saturday night and
Sunday as advance agent and seem-
ed pleased at the enthusiasm dis-
played in the matter by those with
whom he talked. He says the play
was written only to make people
laugh and forget their worries, and
that those who attend next Friday
night will feel when they leave the
opera house that they have had a
little bit more than their money's
worth.

From the moment you enter the
hall your face will commence slip-
ping around and when the curtain
drops on the last act, you will wake
up to the realization that it has
been out of shape for two solid
hours. Every move of the homely
old maids on the stage provokes
mirth. The situations throughout
are ludicrous. But above the din
and roar of the amused audience
can be heard the hum and rattle of
the mysterious Remodeloscope, the
machine that transforms old maids
into handsome young ladies with
sparkling eyes and pearly teeth.

The costumes worn by the ac-

tresses are a scream all by them-
selves. They are fashioned after
the styles "grandma" used to wear,
and the headgear to match is trim-
med with pink daisies and forget-
me-nots.

The main features of the perform-
ance are the song hits and funny
jokes. "I'm So Lonely," sung by
one of the old maids, is almost as
touching as the scene in Uncle
Tom's Cabin when Little Eva bids
her friends good-by. And another
old maid sings that heart-rending
ballad entitled, "He Told Such
Beautiful Lies."

Every bachelor in Bend and tribu-
tary country should come with their
married brothers, prepared to with-
stand a bombardment of something the
old maids might say about them.

Considerable talk has been in-
dulged in regarding the entertain-
ment and from all indications the
opera house will be packed. Beside
the play there are several musical
numbers on the program. Mrs. Grace
Northey, for several years a member
of the Baptist choir at North Yakima,
will sing a solo. Other musical num-
bers include singing by the ladies'
quartet, solo by Mrs. O. A. Pearce,
solo by Dick Anderson and piano
duet by Roscoe Crosby and Ruth
McTaggart. The program will end
with a cakewalk.

The show promises to be the most
amusing seen in Bend this winter.
Several people here were present
when it was presented in Madras
and say it was very enjoyable.
