

## WAR ON SCABIES

No Diseased Cattle to be Admitted to National Forests.

Owing to the existence of scabies in cattle in the counties of Lake and Klamath, there was on May 1, 1911, promulgated a quarantine order by the Governor of Oregon on all cattle in the counties named. An effort is being made by the stockmen and the Bureau of Animal Industry to eradicate the disease by dipping, and as a further prevention of spreading the disease the Forest Service has been asked to cooperate by refusing admittance to any stock for summer range from the two counties above named, unless they are accompanied by a certificate of inspection issued by an employe of the Bureau of Animal Industry.

In following out this plan, Supervisor Harvey states that no cattle from these counties will be admitted to the Deschutes National Forest during the season of 1912 unless accompanied by certificate of inspection issued by an employe of the Bureau of Animal Industry.
