AGREE ON TERMS

Paisley Irrigation Project to Be Carried Out.

SALEM—The state and the Northwest Townsite Co. of Philadelphia have agreed upon the details of the contract under which the company is to undertake reclamation of the Paisley project in Lake county under the Carey act. When the company received the new draft of the contract sent it by the Desert Land Board, it wired the board that all was satisfactory except the clause forbidding the company to sell water to anyone outside the project without a permit from the board. The company plans a reservoir with storage capacity for 30,000 acres, but the project embraces but 12,000 acres. The board recognized the reasonableness of the objection and decided to allow the company to sell water to settlers outside the project providing they give the settlers on the project prior rights at all times.

The Paisley project is considered by state officials and experts to be the most feasible and promising of all the present Carey act projects in Oregon.

POSTMASTER WILL RESIGN.

REDMOND.—J. A. Norwood is going to resign as postmaster here, and J. W. Moore, who came here from the Willamette Valley a few months ago, and has been acting as clerk in the postoffice, has a numerous signed petition for the place. The petition has been forwarded to Congressman A. W. Lafferty.

INCREASES CAPITAL STOCK.

SALEM.—For the purpose of running a railroad the full length of Oregon from Natron, near Eugene, to Ontario, on the Idaho line, and dropping feeders from that line to several important points along the southern border of the state, the Oregon Eastern Railway Company has filed supplementary articles of incorporation with the secretary of state, increasing its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$600,000.

From the main line the company proposes a branch line to Weed, Cal., to connect with the Central Pacific line, a branch from the main line to Agency Plains, a branch to Lakeview and a branch from Lakeview 15 miles south to Goose Lake on the state line.

CHANGE FREIGHT ROUTING.

(Canyon City Eagle.) Auto trucks are now running between Burns and Bend, making the round trip in five days. They make an average of nine miles an hour and carry seven tons of freight. They were built for the business and it is said can operate in two feet of snow. This will no doubt change the routing of a great deal of freight that has been shipped to Harney county via Prairie City.

The local club is now in good working order, and the officers, J. L. Wilcox, president; W. S. Rodman, secretary-treasurer; and E. L. Happ, field manager, are doing all in their power to give Redmond good clean sport along this line. It is expected a large turnout from both Bend and Prineville will be here to attend the tournament.

ASKS FOR A ROAD

Superintendent Recommends Scenic Highway Around Crater Lake.

KLAMATH FALLS.—Superintendent W. Frank Arant, of Crater Lake National Park, has recommended in his report to Secretary of the Interior Walter Fisher, the construction of a road 35 miles around the rim of the crater. The superintendent says the proposed road has been surveyed and for most of the distance it will be from 1000 to 2000 feet above the lake, and at an elevation of from 7000 to 8000 feet above sea level. It will afford an unobstructed view of the surrounding country in all directions and is pronounced as affording one of the grandest scenic views in the world.

In the past season other road surveys were made as follows: From headquarters to south boundary of park, eight miles; west boundary to headquarters, six and one-half miles;

headquarters to lake, five miles; east boundary to rim of lake south of Mount Scott, nine miles.

The present roads were built by Klamath troops 16 years ago and are veritable gutters the width of a wagon, some of them two feet deep.

The superintendent asks for betterment of these roads, for a road sprinkling system and requests that territory be added to the park to make a larger game preserve.
