

MANUAL ARTS TO BE TAUGHT

BEND BOYS WILL LEARN CARPENTRY

Public School Class Will Be Started After the Holidays—Teachers Again Burdened With Too Large Classes—Meeting on Dec. 23.

Manual training in the Bend public school is strongly favored by the School Board, and steps toward beginning a course of instruction in elementary carpentry after the holidays were taken at the monthly meeting Thursday night. Principal Shouse brought up the subject, saying that a room could be fitted up in the basement for the use of a class. His plan is to secure some good practical carpenter for an hour each school morning. The school would furnish the material necessary for the work, the students being required to provide themselves with tools. The board instructed Mr. Shouse to confer with carpenters and see what arrangements could be made for the course and to report to the board.

The board met at the schoolhouse with all the members present. Chairman Overturf swore in Clyde M. McKay as successor to Millard Triplett and he took part in the transactions of the meeting.

Reports made verbally to the board by Principal Shouse showed that the school is again crowded and that another teacher is almost necessary. He outlined several changes that could be made in placing pupils with teachers, but in every case it would give some teacher too much work or crowd a room. The heaviest work now devolves on Miss Vandevort, who has 34 children of the seventh and eighth grades in her charge. Miss Holmes' room has also become crowded again, she having 35 of the smaller children to look after. The board discussed the matter at length but postponed action until it could ascertain what would be the probable attendance after the holidays. Another teacher will be secured unless it is found that a good many of the present enrollment drop out of school.

The attendance was reported by Mr. Shouse as around 220. These are classified as follows: First grade, 33; second, 18; third, 25; fourth, 27; fifth, 20; sixth, 18; seventh, 23; eighth, 20; High School 35.

The clerk read a letter to the board from Miss Florence Young, who is at Lorane, Or., applying for a position as teacher after the holidays.

Prof. J. C. F. Harrington, last year's principal, wrote the board from Jacksonville, Ore., asking for a recommendation to the state board of examiners to assist him in having his low teaching certificate renewed in Oregon. The request was complied with by the directors.

Chairman Overturf reported that he had received notices from the county boundary board to be posted in districts 12 and 31 with reference to a change in the Bend boundary line on petition made by voters of this district. It is proposed to make the south line of district 12 the line between townships 19 and 20. This would extend the present boundary about six miles south. Hearing on the petition will be held at Prineville Jan. 4.

A meeting of the voters of Bend district was called for 8 p. m., Tuesday, Dec. 26, at the schoolhouse for the purpose of making the 1912 school tax levy.

Prof. Shouse was instructed to secure a substitute for Miss Holmes while she is absent at Prineville this week attending teachers' institute.

Informal discussion of the matter of bonding the district in the near future to build a new school building was indulged in, but no definite action was taken. With the rapid increase of the population, it seems that a new building by fall will be required.

Chairman Overturf reported to the board that \$2000 additional insurance had been taken out on the school building and furniture, making the total now carried \$10,000.
