HOMESTEADERS ENJOYING LIFE

CHRISTMAS DANCE WAS BIG EVENT

Settlers From All Parts of Hampton Valley Gather at Home of N. Kins—Rolyat has Good School this Winter—Garage to House Auto Trucks

The homesteaders in the Hampton Valley know how to have a good time during the holiday season. The chief event with them for Christmas was the dance which was given at Nels Kins' home, and there was a big crowd present to enjoy the festivities, according to a report brought to Bend by Victor Schroder, postmaster at Rolyat, in the lower part of the valley. Settlers from all parts of the surrounding country gathered for the festivities, and the big affair of Thanksgiving at Mr. Kins' was duplicated. The homesteaders are a very neighborly class of people, Mr. Schroder said, and know how to have a good time.

Mr. Schroder came to Bend Thursday on the auto truck, along with others, riding in on a passenger auto which was found disabled on the road and loaded on the big freight carrier. He spent two days here, leaving Sunday morning for Davenport, Wash., where he has property which he will look after.

A petition has been sent to the government, Mr. Schroder said, asking for a change in mail service to the Hampton Valley offices. At present the mail is received every Tuesday and it is asked that the day be changed to Wednesday in order to catch the mail that comes in to Fife on Tuesday night.

Rolyat has a good school this winter, with nine children in attendance. Miss Mary Schroder is the teacher.

The little settlement is rapidly forging ahead. Being about half way between Bend and Burns, it is the regular stopping place for the auto trucks and a garage is being built to house the machines. Horace Brookings is building an addition to his home, and other improvements are being made by the settlers.

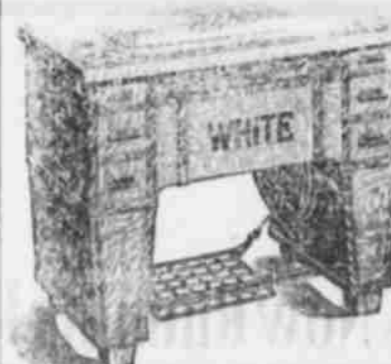
