Game and Fish Commission to Make Trip up the Deschutes.

PORTLAND, Jan. 23. - The Oreon Fish and Game Commission.at its moeting here last week, gave favorable consideration to the report of Superintendent Wilson, showing the feasibility of establishing a hatchery on the Deschutes river at Benham Falls. He said this was a very favorable location and racks could be placed in the river and preparations made for the taking of trout from which to secure eggs for the Bonne-

ville and other hatcheries. It was finally decided to postpone definite action until better weather arrived when the commission will go up the Deschutes river and make a personal inspection of the site and surrounding conditions. In the meantime Came Warden Finley. through his deputies, is to take the emperature of the stream and secure other data desired before the commission orders the construction I racks.

The great difficulty which the commission has so far encountered in the propagation of trout is the scarcity of fish from which to secure the nec esary eggs. Supt. Wilson believes this can be largely overcome by the establishing of a plant at Benham Falls, and the sportsmen of the state who have been cooperating with the commission in this work probably will be delighted at the prospect,
