**HOMESTEADER MISSING**

**Frank Way May Have Been Murdered by His Companion.**

A special dispatch to the Portland Journal from Prineville, dated January 29, says:

"Frank Way, who was living on a homestead 14 or 15 miles above Prineville with Douglas Tapp, another young man of this vicinity, has disappeared mysteriously and is believed to have been murdered for \$150, which he was paid about the time of his disappearance.

Tapp was arrested at Burns this morning, according to advices received by Sheriff Balfour of this county, and will be held on the charge of larceny of one of the saddle horses until the murder mystery can be cleared.

Tapp when questioned as to the whereabouts of Way has said that he went hunting, and again that he went to visit his mother, who lives in the Willamette Valley. Communication with Way's mother shows that Way has never been there, and search of his cabin reveals all his best clothes which he would have worn had he been going to the valley, and also his rifle, which he would have taken had he been going hunting.

Efforts are now being made by the sheriff's office to find the body of the supposedly murdered man."

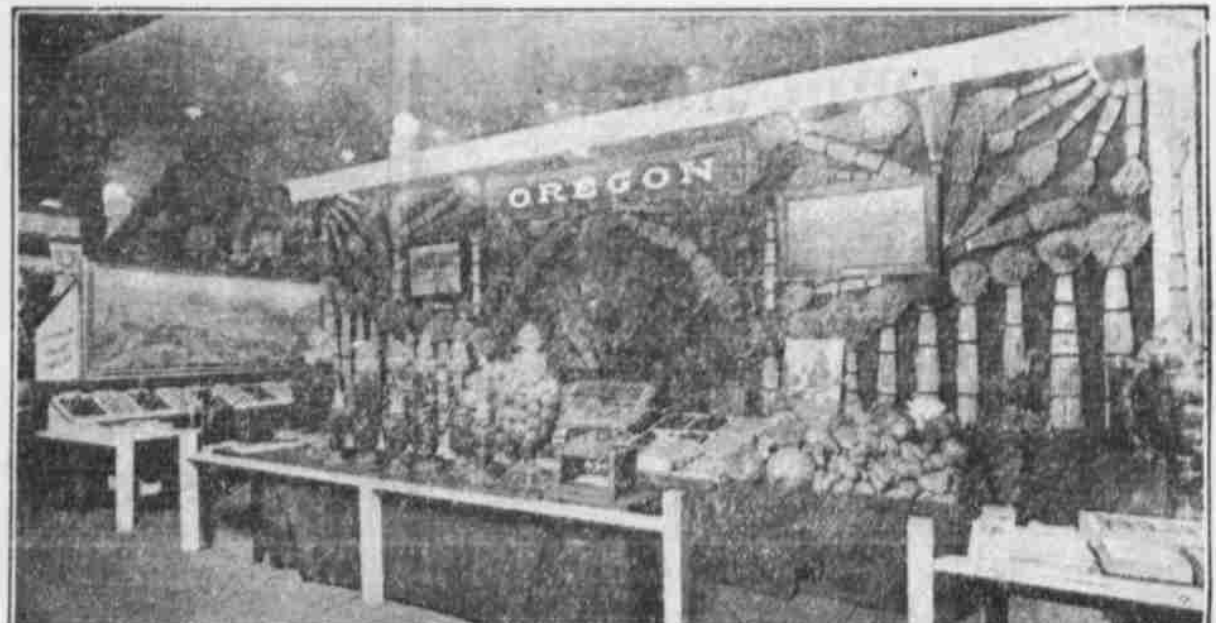
