

TRUCKS GO ON BURNS ROUTE

COMPANY IS RE- ORGANIZED

Lockwood Head Trucking Project
and go to Burns to Arrange for
Tonnage—Big Trade to Har-
ney by Way of Bend Assured

The first auto trucks to try the
Bend-Burns trip for more than a
month left Bend on the long journey
yesterday, working for the reorgan-
ized Central Oregon Trucking Com-
pany, which was re-incorporated
yesterday with W. B. Lockwood as
president and general manager and
J. Maso Lockwood as secretary and
treasurer.

Mr. and Mrs. Lockwood left yester-
day in their touring car for Burns,
where they will remain several days
arranging with Harney county mer-
chants to have their goods brought
by way of Bend, instead of by the
longer and more expensive route
to Vale or Ontario.

"We are putting on two Packard
trucks now," said Mr. Lockwood
yesterday, "and just as soon as we
get them there are two more trucks
to enter the service. If the enter-
prise part of the Harney county
merchants comes this way, as seems prob-
able, there will be enough work to
keep six or eight trucks busy. And
as what I have heard from them,
the Burns merchants are more than
willing to supply east-bound tonnage
on the trucks, for as soon as regular
service is maintained, they say they
will get all their Portland goods via
Bend."

Go With Light Loads.
The two trucks left with light
loads, probably having little more
than three and a half tons between
them. At Brookings they will pick
up the load left there by the truck
which was forced to abandon the
Bend-Burns trip when it left Bend Jan-
uary 23.

Lee Merrill of Portland is driving
the truck, and J. Hargrave
is other. C. J. Merrill, brother of
Lee, is the mechanic of the com-
pany, and was one of the first men to
be employed by the Packard people
in the Northwest.

Longest Truck Trip.
According to F. C. Riggs, North-
west manager for the Packard com-
pany, the Bend-Burns route is the
longest used by trucks in the United
States, and perhaps in the world.
The journey covers 142 1/2 miles. Mr.
Riggs, accompanied by Attorney R.
Newall, was here Monday, making
arrangements with the Lock-
woods.

Mr. Lockwood states that there
were some 35 tons of freight consign-
ments to Burns now in the Bend ware-
house. Yesterday another ship-
ment arrived, and it is expected that
it will come from now on.

Carry no Passengers.
Manager Lockwood was particu-
larly emphatic in stating that his com-
pany did not enter the passenger carry-
ing business.

"We shall keep our hands off that
business," he said, "and don't intend to
compete with anyone, or buck anyone,"
he said. At present the passenger busi-
ness is conducted by the Burns-Bend
Consolidated Auto Co., which has
cars in the service. J. H. We-
ber is the Bend agent.
