

DAVIES BEGINS NEW BUILDING

CONTRACTOR TO RUSH THE WORK

Frame Structure Planned to Replace That Destroyed by Fire—Two Store Rooms, One of Which Corkeitt Will Occupy Soon.

Contract for the erection of a one-story frame building on lot 3 of block 10, the site of the one destroyed by fire Sunday night, March 3, was let yesterday by H. H. Davies to K. D. McIntosh. It will be 44x50 feet in dimensions and contain two store rooms.

Work will be rushed so as to have one room ready, if possible, by Easter, (April 7), for C. H. Corkeitt, who will reopen his candy and confectionery store. The building will have plate glass front, metal ceiling and corrugated iron walls.

Mr. Davies is building with the idea of later on moving the frame structure away and putting up a stone or brick building. There will be a space of three feet left on each side so that in case owners of adjoining property put up fireproof buildings Mr. Davies can go in with them on a party wall. He said that just at present he was not able to build of brick or stone.

W. C. Bredenhagen is in Portland on a business trip, and it was not known yesterday by Mr. Davies whether he would lease one of the store rooms, but it is thought that he will. This location is considered one of the best in town, and it was on this account that Mr. Davies did not want to delay building until he could put up a more substantial block.

Lara Builds Addition.
Excavation work was started yesterday on an addition to the Lara store, at the rear on Oregon street. The one-story part which was divided into offices has been removed. The addition will be of one story and occupied by the grocery department.

The Caldwell building which was damaged by fire has been repaired, as also the structure in which G. F. Hurt has his shoe shop.

BRIGHT FUTURE FOR INDUSTRY

BRICK PLANT STARTS THIS WEEK

Horn, Scott and Colver Install Big Equipment in Local Yard—Product Will be the Best—Field for Sale is Promising.

This week the manufacture of first class brick is commenced by a local firm, the Bend Brick & Lumber Co., who begin work with their modern plant that has been installed at their yard west of town. Thoroughly equipped with every kind of up-to-date brick making machinery, with a substantial capital behind the enterprise and a big field for its products close at hand, the new industry promises much for the development of Bend.

W. E. Scott, A. H. Horn and R. C. Colver each own a third of the brick company. Mr. Horn was the owner of the first brick plant which operated on a small scale last year. Mr. Scott is an old Bend resident, and Mr. Colver is a Seattle man who came here some months ago. In addition to the brick yard the company owns a saw mill, which is now being moved from its location a few miles southeast of town to the brick plant site.

Cost of Plant Great.
The brick making machinery has cost the company more than \$75,000, according to Mr. Scott, and not only is the finest and most complete in Central Oregon but will make the Bend plant as well equipped as any of its capacity in the state.

An "Arnold Creager" soft mud press is on the way from New London, Ohio. Its cost there is \$2500 and the freight will come to \$800. A disintegrator arrived recently and has been installed.

Buildings go up.
In starting their work at the yard the company already has erected seven dwelling houses, a large bunk house and a barn. As many more houses will be constructed during the summer, as the working force is increased. At the outset the brick making pay roll will number 18 men, and the output of the plant will be 20,000 bricks daily, although that number can be raised to 30,000 if the equipment is worked to capacity.

The first products, which are being made this week, will be repressed brick. J. C. Freeman of Portland, an expert in the work, will manage the manufacturing end of the yard.

Quality Will Be High
"We are not going to make poor brick," said Mr. Scott yesterday. "For we don't believe there is a market for cheap 'shop mud' products. All we turn out will be the best. We have spent a lot of money in having tests made, and every report that comes in has been of the best. There is no doubt that this Bend clay is as good as can be had anywhere, and as our machinery is the best we could buy, it really seems as if we should turn out a brick that will be a credit to the town."

It is the intention of the company to manufacture and sell at about \$10 a thousand at the yard, or deliver for \$11.50. According to those interested in the new enterprise, the price will be identical with that of similar quality brick purchased on the outside.

Tests are now being made of the clay for sewer pipe use, and should they prove successful, as anticipated, the company will manufacture that product. In every department there is not only an excellent market in Bend for the products, but a large territory to be served in the towns along the railroad to the north.

Car Loads Shipped First.
The brick company has the distinction of having received the first carload that came to Bend, and of having shipped out the first car load. The import was machinery and the export lumber.

At present a 32 horse-power steam engine generates the power used at the yard. It is expected to replace this engine with a larger and more modern one in the near future. The plant is located on the old Barney Lewis homestead, 1 1/2 miles west of Bend.

VOTERS REGISTER
Residents Slow in Getting on the Books for Primaries.
The registration of voters of Bend precinct up to noon yesterday was 102, a large number having failed to register yet. For Deschutes precinct and the country districts around Bend the registration was about 50.
