

MAKES HIKE OF 63 MILES

HOMESTEADER SHOWS HIS GRIT

Failing to Secure Hide in Auto or Wagon, Forrest Needt Sets Out Afoot to His Claim in the Hampton Valley Country.

Homesteading in a new country takes grit, perseverance, and nerve to do unpleasant things. This was found out by Forrest Needt last week, when he started out to his claim in Hampton valley, 63 miles from here. Needt had been day clerk at the Hotel Bend, but decided to go out on his homestead and get ready to start last Wednesday. He expected to ride out in an auto going to Burns, but at the last moment a woman passenger showed up and wanted the seat, and he let her have it.

He then thought he would catch a ride with a friend who was going out by wagon, but he also missed this chance. Not to be outdone, however, Needt set out afoot. The first day he made it to Millican's ranch, 25 miles, where he spent the night. Not being used to such strenuous exercise, Needt found that walking made blisters on his feet. He had the stick-to-it spirit, however, and after getting the blisters doctored continued on his journey, making the rest of the distance on Thursday.

Needt has a 320-acre claim. He already has 20 acres cleared and will get 40 acres more put in shape for cultivation this spring. A few weeks ago A. T. Frame, who has a claim near Needt's, walked part of the way in to tend to get his team, which he had been wintering in a pasture near town.

GETS FULL PAYMENT

Thomas Tweet Completes Deal Selling 90 Acres Next to Lytle.

Thomas Tweet received last week the balance due him on the land he sold last summer, the entire amount totaling \$5500.

The property involved is 30 acres in the S. E. quarter of the N. E. quarter of section 29, which lies along the east bank of the river adjoining Lytle. The purchaser is W. C. Garrett of Oklahoma. Mr. Tweet states he has other deals pending for the disposal of property on the west bank of the river.

FISHING LICENSE

A supply of blanks has been sent to H. J. Overturf and anyone desiring a license may get one of these. If it in, have acknowledgement taken before a notary public and send it, together with \$1, to County Clerk Brown at Prineville, who will issue the license. The notarial fee will be 25 cents, making the license cost \$1.25.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken by this office as having been confessed by you, and your said entry will be canceled thereunder without your further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below your answer, under oath specifically meeting and responding to these allegations of contest or if you fail within that time to file in this office due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on said contestant either in person or by registered mail. If this service is made by the delivery of a copy of your answer to the contestant in person, proof of such service must be either the said contestant's written acknowledgment of his receipt of the copy, showing the date of its receipt, or the affidavit of the person by whom the said copy was made stating when and where the copy was delivered; if made by registered mail, proof of such service must consist of the affidavit of the person by whom the copy was mailed stating when and the postoffice to which it was mailed and this affidavit must be accompanied by the postmaster's receipt for the letter.
