ASSESSMENTS DUE

Water Users' Association Members
to Contribute to Organization

Pursuant to the provisions of
article 4 of the organization's by-
laws, last week Secretary Snyder of
the Central Oregon Irrigation Com-
pany Water Users' Association
mailed a communication to every
member requesting them to pay as-
sessment in arrears.

The article in question reads as
follows:

Section 4.—The Board of Direc-
tors shall within five days of the lev-
ying of any assessment cause written
notice thereof to be sent by mail to
all persons against whom such as-
sessment has been levied, stating
the amount and date thereof and the
person to whom the same is payable.
If any member shall neglect or re-
fuse to pay any assessment duly
levied against him by the Board of
Directors for a period of 30 days
after written notice thereof has been
sent to his address, then the Board
of Directors shall have the right to
proceed to collect the same by pro-
cess of law. And every person sign-
ing these By-Laws expressly agrees
to pay all assessments duly levied
against him in accordance with the
provisions thereof of any amend-
ment thereto and expressly agrees
that such assessments, together with
reasonable costs of collection thereof
shall be a personal obligation against
him and against his property and
shall constitute a lien on all lands
purchased or contracted for by him
under the provisions of the Carey
Act in the segregation of the Central
Oregon Irrigation Company. And
said lien may be enforced accord-
ing to the law governing the enforce-
ment of liens upon real estate in the
State of Oregon.

contestant's written acknowledgment

fidavit of the person by whom the de-
