Homestead Measure Passed by House Last Week.

The three-year homestead bill was passed last Wednesday by the lower house of Congress. The House having made some amendments to the Senate bill, the measure will go to conference for final adjustment. Its enactment into law is assured, however, practically as passed. This means that three years' residence will be required hereafter instead of five, and that a five-months leave of absence will be granted each year.
