CANDIDATES NUMEROUS

MANY ASPIRANTS IN PRIMARIES.

Two Bend Men, Forbes and Ellis, Have Bright Chances—Crook County Candidate Crop Is a Bumper One

With the closing of the registration for the Primary Elections Tuesday, the contest enters its last stage. The registration throughout the county has been heavier than ever before.

However, it is expected that there will be a far larger vote than the number of those who registered, for under the recently rendered ruling of Attorney General Crawford a voter who has not registered may be sworn in at the polls, upon petition of six free holders who vouch for his eligibility.

The Candidates.

For Congress from this district George T. Cochran, W. R. Ellis, C. E. Roosevelt, John P. Rusk and N. J. Sinnott are in the race. Claude

M. Covey and J. H. Graham are the democratic candidates for nomination. Jonathan Bourne has three com-

petitors for reelection as senator, S. A. Lowell, J. W. Morton and Ben Seiling. Mr. Bourne is doing no campaigning, but instead is leaving the matter of his selection to be decided on the strength of his record. The democrat senatorial aspirants are, O. P. Coshaw, Harry Lane, M. A. Miller and Walter M. Pierce.

Ben Olecott has Frank S. Fields against him for the state secretaryship, and John B. Ryan, democrat.

The candidates for republican nomination for district attorney in this district are W. A. Bell, C. L. Pepper and E. C. Smith. No democrats are out.

Crook County Crop Large

There are two republican candidates for nomination for state representative, Vernon A. Forbes of Bend and Wesley O. Smith of Klamath Falls.

The primaries have brought more candidates into the field than ever before appeared in Crook county.

For county judge, the present incumbent, H. C. Ellis of Bend, seems to have decidedly the best of the race, according to the early indications. The other nomination seekers are G. A. McFarlane of Redmond, G. Springer, William Boegli and C. O. Pollard. Springer alone being a democrat.

T. N. Balfour, the present incumbent, has against him for democratic nomination John H. Edwards. The republican candidates are Frank

Elkins, C. D. Brown of Bend and J. F. McTaggart of Madras.

F. A. Rice and R. L. Brewster are opponents for the republican nomination for county surveyor. Howard Turner of Madras opposes Warren Brown for county clerk.

W. E. Van Allen of Redmond is a republican aspirant for the county

assessorship, being opposed by Lewis Wyde of Prineville.
