

REGISTRATION TOTALS 2425

COUNTY INCREASE 30
PER CENT SINCE 1910

Head Shows Gain of 27 1/2 Per Cent,
204 Registered—Republicans Out-
number Democrats 2 to 1—
Complete Table Precincts.

The total registration in Crook county for Friday's primary election is 2425, as against 1800 in 1910, showing an increase of about 30 per cent.

Bend's registration is 304, as contrasted with 160 at the last election, a gain of 27 1/2 per cent.

The registration shows 1546 Republicans, 688 Democrats, 29 Prohibitionists, 112 Socialists and 50 Independents.

Locally, the tables show 147 Republicans, 53 Democrats, 2 Socialists, 1 Independent and one who refused to say what he was.

establishment of the much-discussed enterprise.

Big Force and Payroll.

A mill such as will be operated in Bend will scarcely have a capacity of less than 50 million feet a year, perhaps more. Such a plant means the employment of about 500 men, all told, and a monthly payroll of \$25,000 said Dr. Brooks.

Conservatively reckoning three dependents to each worker, the mill will mean an increase in Bend's population of 1500 persons. In this connection, however, it is pointed out that inevitably subsidiary industries, such as box and sash and door manufactories, with extensive payrolls, would spring up, in connection with a lumber mill.

"It is possible to suppose that when such a mill as is under consideration is established here 50 million feet of timber will be manufactured annually by it. Such an amount is very easily centralized here. But with logging railroads—an inevitable development under the almost ideal conditions encountered—the field from which logs for Bend manufacture may be drawn is practically inexhaustible," continued Dr. Brooks.

The timber holdings of The Bend Company total about 30 million feet. The Brooks companies control some 600 million, the Mueller interests 700 million, making a total of 1330 million feet.

On the basis that no further timber is purchased—which is practically an impossible contingency—this would mean that a 50 million foot annual cut could be made for seven years.

plying the energy. A huge churn, copper-lined cream ripener, elaborate cream testers (which show scientifically the exact amount of butter fat) and other lesser mechanical contrivances complete the plant's equipment, which cost about \$2000.

Begin Operations Next Week.

The floor space occupied by the creamery is 24x60 feet, with extra cold storage room to meet all requirements. The ice used is supplied by the adjoining ice plant.

It is expected that the creamery will be in operation next week. J. K. Cooper, brother of S. R. Cooper, will be in charge, with one assistant at the start.

A large stock of the best grade-gallon milk cans have been purchased by Mr. Cooper, which will be sold to the farmers at cost, approximately at 75 cents each. Pay for these will be taken in trade.

BANK ARCHITECT HERE

M. J. Deeser of Seattle Getting New Building Under Way.

M. J. Deeser, a member of the Seattle firm of architects which is erecting for the First National Bank its new building, arrived at the Hotel Bend last night.

Mr. Deeser this morning stated that sub-contracts will be let shortly for the various portions of the construction, such as plumbing, plastering, electrical work, etc. Probably brick laying and carpentering will be done by day work under their representative, F. Frodeson.

"All specifications are here at the bank," said Mr. Deeser, "and we want contractors to get to work with them. In every case we will favor local men and materials, just as far as possible."

Do Distributing Business.

In addition to the ice manufacturing, the company will get into the front rank of Bend's growing list of distributing enterprises. In his cold storage rooms Mr. Hall will carry extensive lines of soft drinks, as well as beer for several breweries for which he is agent.

One of the important selling fields already developed and waiting for the plant to get into operation is Burns, where Mr. Hall states he already has arranged for extensive sale of the bottled goods he will carry.

"We are proud of the plant we're putting in," said Mr. Hall, "and we believe that Bend people will be interested in seeing what we have. So tell them we shall be glad to show folks around any time."

REMODEL LIBRARY BUILDING.

The building for the library is being remodeled and will be ready to be occupied in a few days. There will be a reading room with about 1250 feet of floor space, rest room and place for storing wood. The reading room will connect with the rest room and the latter with the church. Both will have entrances from Oregon street. Large windows give the library room excellent light. There will be a 20-foot porch on Oregon street. The inside will be papered attractively.
