A mill such as will be operated in flend will scarcely have a capacity of less than 50 million feet a year, perhaps more. Such a plant means the employment of about 500 men, all told, and a monthly payroll of \$25,000 said Dr. Brooks.

Conservatively reckoning three dependents to each worker, the mill will mean an increase in Bend's population of 1500 persons. In this ennection. however, it is pointed out that inevitably subsidiary indusries, such as box and sash and door nanufactories, with extensive payolls, would spring up, in connection at that time it is expected that final will be in charge, with one ass stant with a lumber mill.

"It is possible to suppose that when such a mill as is under consideration is established here 50 miltion feet of timber will be manufactured annually by it.
