

# PRINEVILLE IS AGAIN DEFEATED

## BEND GIRLS WIN AT BASKET BALL

Second Half of Game Friday Night Exciting—Final Score 15 to 7. Biggest Crowd of Season Cheers Work of Players of the Teams

Before the biggest crowd that has seen a basket ball game here this season, the Bend girls defeated the young women from Prineville Friday evening by a score of 15 to 7. The second half of the contest was very exciting, the score being tied part of the time. Numerous fouls by both teams, detracted somewhat from the otherwise good exhibition.

During the first half only one goal was thrown from the field, this being by Prineville. Bend ran up a score of 4 by throwing foul goals and the county seat girls added another point the same way, making the score at the end of the half 4 to 3.

The second part of the contest started with a rush, both teams having a good chance of victory. Prineville threw the second field goal and took the lead. Bend came back in a moment with a foul goal and tied the game. The spectators became greatly enthused and the twelve girls played with all their energy. There were many tumbles, but no one got hurt and there was no rough playing. The visitors found it difficult to keep their feet on the slippery floor, and a large number of the fouls called on them were for sliding across the boundary lines. Miss Noble, playing guard for Prineville, worked so hard that she became exhausted and had to quit the game. Miss Livingston went from center to forward and Miss Dobbs was sent in to play center.

### Work of Guards a Feature.

Bend's first field goal did not come till the second half was well along. The forwards seemed unable to get the ball into the basket when they had chances. However, the work of the guards on both sides was excellent, they being responsible in great part for the few goals from the field. Miss Black started the field scoring for Bend, and after that Prineville had no chance to win. Miss Young followed this with another goal and the final score for the locals was 15 points. Prineville succeeded in getting another goal, which made their total number of points 7.

### Visitors are Applauded.

The large crowd applauded the good plays of the visitors as well as those of the locals, giving the Prineville young women a warm welcome. Before the game and during the intermission the band played, and after the contest there was dancing for those who wished to remain. While here the young women were guests of the basket ball girls and others, remaining over Saturday.
