## JUDGE ELLIS IS EXONERATED

ACCOUNTANT SAYS HIS PAPERS O. K.

Published Insinuations Against County Official, Made by Political Adversary, Disproved by Crandall's Statement of Audit.

In reference to a paid political advertisement appearing in last week's Crook County Journal, wherein it was stated, among other things, that no accounting appeared of record of certain road funds handled by Commissioner Bayley or Judge Ellis, The Bulletin, to ascertain the exact facts especially in reference to the candidacy of Judge Ellis, called up Max Crandall of the firm of Crandall & Roberts, expert accountants now auditing the records of all county officials.

Crandall's Statement.  
Mr. Crandall stated that he had fully audited Judge Ellis' accounts for the so-called emergency road fund and found the same absolutely correct; that Judge Ellis kept all such funds in a separate account at the bank and paid out all moneys by check; that in addition to receipts on file with each accounting from time to time Judge Ellis had submitted his original bank books, showing deposits and all paid canceled checks to assist the accountants in verifying every transaction.

He went on to state that Judge Ellis had from time to time filed his

accountings with vouchers attached thereto, usually at the January and July terms of court; that the same have all been approved from time to time by the two commissioners and spread upon the records of the county court and duly published in the official county paper, and that such reports are and always have been on file and a matter of public record open to the inspection of any one desiring to know the facts; that the last accounting was presented at the January, 1912, term of the county court, approved in writing by each of the county commissioners, filed and due record and entry made thereof and published as required by law.
