

# HOLSTEIN COWS FROM ILLINOIS

## TWO CARLOADS FOR FARMERS HERE

Bates Brings Bossies For Bend Bank. Will Be Sold Friday and Saturday at Old Experimental Farm Northeast of Town.

George Bates brought 43 cows and one bull from Elgin, Ill., arriving on last Friday. These cattle have been imported by the First National Bank to be distributed at cost among the ranchers of this vicinity as an aid in building up dairy herds.

All are Holsteins, of good blood, and are expected to be fresh this spring. Friday and Saturday, at the Jones & Bates place two miles northeast of town on the old experimental farm, where they are being kept, the cows will be sold at private sale, for either cash or credit. During the week many people have been out to look them over, the consensus of opinion being that all are good specimens of fine milking Holsteins.

**Unloaded Ten Times.** Mr. Bates purchased the cows in the vicinity of Elgin, making many trips about that point before he could pick up just what was wanted.

On the return journey the two cars were shipped over the Milwaukee, the Great Northern, S. P. & S. and Oregon Trunk roads. In transit, says Mr. Bates, it was necessary to unload the cows ten times for watering and feeding.

"One thing about the trip," said Mr. Bates, "was that back in Illinois it is colder than here. The late spring seems to extend over the entire country."

**COUNTY DIVISION.**  
To the Editor of The Bulletin:  
The writer recently made a trip from Redmond to a point 48 miles southeast of Prineville and was still 20 miles from Paulina, all in Crook county.

There was the common complaint—high taxes and other parts of the county get all the road work. The county is entirely too large for economical management, and I believe that the interests of the people—I do not count politicians and town lot speculators—of the whole county would be best served by a fair division.

I was opposed to two former schemes of division for reasons that I believe were good, but conditions are now changed. The railroads have determined where the centers of population are likely to be, and have provided a means of communication between the communities of the desired new county.

I suggest the following plan for organizing Deschutes county comprising that part of Crook county lying south of Metolius and Crooked rivers and west of a line to be located by a joint committee to be appointed by the commercial clubs of Prineville, Bend and Redmond.

Let Bend and Redmond draw straws or play seven up for temporary county seat for two years, the town getting it to furnish free offices for that term. At the end of two years have an election for permanent county seat, with an agreement—a gentlemen's agreement—that the winning town shall furnish free offices for the ensuing two years.

I have consulted no one with regard to this matter, but throw it out for what it is worth, and send copies to both Prineville papers and all papers in the proposed county.
