T. R. LEADS TAFT BY 154.

"Standpaters" Swamped in the
Drift Towards Colonel.

Of 844 Delegates Roosevelt Has 239,
Taft 85 and 118 Are Uninstructed.
Contested, 160, Including 88 From
New York—Senator Dixon's Figures
Show Nation Wide Trend.

Washington, D. C.—Senator Dixon at the Roosevelt headquarters today said: "Six hundred and forty-four delegates to the Republican national convention have been elected up to date. Of these 239 are for Colonel Roosevelt, 85 for Mr. Taft, 6 for Senator Cummins, 36 for Senator La Follette, 118 are uninstructed, including 88 from New York state, and contests are pending in the cases of the remaining 100."

COLONEL ROOSEVELT MAY WIN IN OHIO

Indications Are That He Will Carry
Taft's Own State.

Cleveland, O.—In the present contest for the nomination for president the indications are that in Ohio, President Taft's own state, Colonel Roosevelt will receive forty-four out of forty-six delegates to the national convention. This will be a bitter pill for Mr. Taft's managers to swallow.

The progressive movement has not only stirred the voters of Ohio, but of the whole country—the plain people—to assert their rights of enfranchisement as guaranteed them under the constitution, and the wholesale breaking away from the rule of the bosses in this state and elsewhere is like a tidal wave sweeping over the land.

Never in the political history of this country have the voters given so much thought to the right of the people to rule as is manifested in this campaign, and when the Ohio state convention takes place on May 21 the policies of Colonel Roosevelt will be endorsed by the voters in no uncertain language.

NEW JERSEY JOINS THE MOVEMENT TO STOP BOSSES.

Indications That Roosevelt Will Secure
Every One of the Delegates.

Trenton, N. J.—Interest in the campaign for the Republican nominee for president is growing hotter and hotter in this state as the day for the New Jersey state convention, May 28, approaches, and the indications are that Colonel Roosevelt will secure the whole number of state delegates, twenty-four, to the national convention.

"The right of the people" to rule and the desire to break away from the "rule of the bosses" are just as strong in this state as in any throughout the country, and as Illinois, Pennsylvania, Maine, Nebraska, Oregon and other states have set the example of endorsing the progressive movement as enunciated by Colonel Roosevelt, showing that this is a country "of the people, for the people and by the people."

MARYLAND TO BE IN LINE.

A Solid Roosevelt Delegation Expected
From State Convention.

Baltimore, Md.—The Maryland Republican state convention will be held on May 6, and the interest in the outcome of the contest to secure the Republican nomination for president is becoming more intense each day.

PETITION FOR NEW HIGHWAY

CHANGE IN HAMPTON VALLEY NEEDED

Effort Being Made to Eliminate the
Stretch of Road Which Runs
Through Corner of Lake County.
Several Reasons Set Forth.

To The Bend Bulletin, Commercial Club, Business Men and the Public, Bend, Oregon:

At an enthusiastic meeting of the homesteaders of Hampton valley an organization was formed and named Hampton Valley Improvement Association, which chose for officers, A. T. Fraime, president; V. Schreder, secretary; L. E. Miller, treasurer; A. B. Foss, E. L. Riggs, Ole Drouxwold, H. S. Miller A. Weber, Ike Zeroff, Burr Black, Walter Harrison, J. O. Whitaker, Forrest Neeld and Dick Phillips are charter members.

The object of the association is to work in harmony for the mutual advancement of every development, such as a new country like the Hampton Valley is in need of, and cooperate with any and all organizations for the benefit of Central Oregon and the state at large.

Some few days ago Judge H. C. Ellis, Commissioner Bayley and Surveyor Rice drove down the southeast end of Crook county to investigate a proposition of changing the Bend-Burns road, the part which runs for 18 miles in Lake county, north of Glass Buttes, into a road all in Crook county, for several reasons:

First, there is no road to accommodate the mail carrier, a government official, between Rolyat and Pife, and for the past two years the mail carrier has had to travel through tall sagebrush for a distance of 15 miles before he connects with a trail to travel; therefore, it is a necessity.

Second, there is at least 30 homesteaders in Buck valley isolated from the world without any road, and if they wish to go to Bend or railroad facilities they have to travel from 15 to 30 miles more each way. It takes time and costs money and it is inconvenient.

Third, people who wish to go to

Pife from Bend, or vice versa, would save 15 miles and have a better road than by any county road now established.

Fourth, this proposed new road, all in Crook county, will also shorten the distance between Bend and Burns from 6 to 8 miles and cost less to keep in good condition than the piece of road around Glass Buttes.

Fifth, the 18 miles of Bend-Burns road in Lake county is a joker to everyone who has anything to do with it. Lake county has no benefit whatsoever in it and to expect it to spend any tax funds to keep it in good condition for travel is out of the question. Crook county cannot legally spend any tax money to do so and if the road has to be kept in order it must be done by subscription and donation from the homesteaders and business men of Bend and Burns; and as it should be considered as a tax from Crook county people, it would be infinitely more proper to improve a necessary road in Crook county, to accommodate Crook county homesteaders and old settlers. Automobiles and freight truck owners and drivers have to strain the machines beyond their capacity to go through this 18 miles of road in Lake county which has been favorably endowed this winter on account of very little snow. In any ordinary year this piece of road will be impassable to travel from fall until June as the snow from Glass Buttes drains from the hillside into the road all the time.

As to the proposed new road I wish to state from personal examination that no great amount of labor is necessary to put it in fair condition to travel and by request of the County Court the writer, with Ronald Conkling has laid out the new road and petitions are being circulated to open same, and the general public is requested to interest itself in this matter so as to have the road opened at an early date.
