

# WILL HAVE BIG TIME ON FOURTH

## BEND TO CELEBRATE THIS YEAR

Committee Working on Plans—Aeroplane Possible, Good Baseball Contest—Commercial Club Makes Splendid Progress.

Definite steps toward a big Fourth of July celebration here are well under way, a committee has been appointed and every effort is being made to plan out a schedule of attractions that will make Bend's Fourth the best thing of its kind that ever has been attempted in Central Oregon.

The committee, which is to have general charge of arrangements, consists of John Elkins, J. D. Davidson, Bert Roberts, H. W. Skuse and A. M. Lara, chairman. Morris Lara, as president of the Commercial Club, is an ex-officio member of the committee.

### Definite Plans Soon.

Exactly what will be "doing" is as yet, of course, not settled. Through correspondence the committee is feeling out various possibilities, among which are offers from aeroplane flyers, one of whom it is possible may be brought here. If so, this would be the first bird-man flight ever witnessed in the interior, and would attract a particularly widespread interest.

Baseball, of course, will form a part of the fun. With a Bend team organizing, with sound financial backing and a good lot of material to pick from, there undoubtedly will be at least one good game and perhaps two, in connection with the celebration.

The managing committee of the baseball team has taken up the matter of a Fourth of July game with Prineville and other county teams. Falling to make connections with one of these, it already is in receipt of several attractive offers from good Portland nines.

Among other attractions it is probable a good speaker will be secured, with probably log rolling, horse racing, bucking contests, obstacle canoe races, etc.

Last year there was no celebration

here, everyone helping out at Prineville's good time. It is expected that this year, especially in view of the fact that Bend kept out of the running last season, many county seaters will be on hand to enjoy the fun here.

**Commercial Club Doing Well**

competence of women is now recognized in all phases of social responsibility except that of the franchise. We claim that this phase demands our assistance since it vitally bears upon all other phases. Among these phases is the home. Today the food that comes upon our table, the clothes we wear, our meat and drink, our ethics and our morals are falling under the regulation of law and hence becoming political questions. The woman no longer controls her family's food supply with the kettle and spoon of the days of individual undertaking, but by the vote which says how the great socialized industry of modern life shall be carried on.

Pure food, sanitation, education. This and all else is today a twin sister to politics. In essence, then, the movement toward woman's political equality is a movement toward better homemakers and a greater, grander motherhood.
