DEMONSTRATION WORK STARTED

W. L. POWERS HAS CHARGE IN COUNTY

Already 35 Farmers are Doing Co-operative Experiment Work in Many Districts—Superintendent's Office Hours Announced

W. L. Powers, superintendent of the Crook County Demonstration Farms, was here last week, after a day spent in the Hampton country, getting co-operative farmers started. In that territory he reports the outlook excellent, thanks to the generous rains of the last ten days.

Prof Powers has a 40-acre irrigated ranch in charge near Redmond, and 80 acres of dry land at Metolius. However, he expects an assistant at the latter place soon.

There are now 35 farmers throughout the county who are doing co-operative work in connection with the main farms—devoting a few acres to experiments under the supervision of the director. Among these co-operators are P. H. Dencer and T. E. Curry, Bend; G. A. Bradley, La Pine; A. A. Frantz, Whitaker; A. S. Fogg and E. Van Lake, Hampton; Guy LaFollette and C. H. Foster, Powell Butte; H. Brookhuis, Rolyat; W. H. Courtney and J. W. Brown, Laidlaw.

Powers' Office Hours.

Mr. Powers reports that hereafter he will be at Metolius Tuesdays and Thursdays, between train times, where his office is in the Metolius State Bank building. There he will have a selected library of dry farming literature, and a supply of booklets for free distribution.

The Redmond office hours are on Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons, from one to five, and every evening when in town, in his office over the Bank of Commerce. A laboratory is being equipped in connection with the Redmond office, where quick approximate analysis of soils, water, alkali and seeds will be made. The laboratory is now equipped with instruments for soil surveying, leveling, and measurement of water.

MEETINGS ARE OF INTEREST

W. C. T. U. HOLDS CONVENTION HERE.

Ladies Had Extensive Program Last Week, With Mrs. Helen D. Harford as Leader—Good Report From Many Points.

Mrs. Helen D. Harford began her mission of instruction and inspiration to the Crook County W. C. T. U. Institute by her lecture on "Good Citizenship" on Thursday evening, May 30.

Some took exception to the fact that she was introduced to the audience by a man. To such be it said that this organization is advocating not exclusively women's rights, but equal rights. Please observe that when women have the power they do not "return evil for evil." This lecture of Mrs. Harford's and her talk Friday evening on "Why Women in Oregon Should Vote," ought to allay the fears of many men as to what will become of their rights in public and home life when women get the vote.

In the absence of the county president, Mrs. Wilda Belfnap, the Saturday sessions were conducted by the local president.

Mrs. Harford gave a clear statement of "Our Foundation Principles." Mrs. Myer of Culver, in telling of what their union is doing showed that one of the county's newest unions is a "model union." Mrs. Watson gave a good report of the work at Redmond. Mrs. Percival, who did not come till evening, then told of what Madras is doing.

The women kept J. M. Lawrence busy answering questions concerning the laws of the state relating to the liquor traffic. Mrs. Clara Hoffman's paper on "Literature" gave original and practical suggestions as to how to make the best of this, "the strongest but too little used weapon."
