NEW YORK MATTERS.

Important Resolutions Considered in Annual Session.

Among resolutions approved at the late session of the Empire State Grange were the following: Relative to the proposed removal of certain restrictions from the law permitting oleo to be sold as butter the committee stated that it was unalterably opposed to any change in the present law affecting the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine or any other substance made in imitation of butter and that it was opposed to any reduction in the present tax on colored oleomargarine, but were in favor of strengthening the present laws in the interests of both producer and consumer of butter and advised co-operation with the National Dairy Union in its efforts to protect the dairy interests and the public.

Regarding the relation of commission men to shippers, the grange recommended that the standing committee on legislation be instructed to co-operate with all shipping associations interested in securing the enactment of a law that will properly safeguard the interests of shippers and place such regulations upon commission men as will protect the interests of the shippers. Another resolution acted upon was one requesting congress to restore the duty on cream so that it will correspond to the duty on butter. The committee favored the resolution and said that the tariff in discriminating in favor of one as against the other

would make it easy for shippers of cream into this country to avoid the laws by shipping cream with a high butter fat content.

The report opposed the present election law known as the Levy law, as it subserves no useful purpose, and in that the court of appeals has pronounced certain features of it unconstitutional there is no justification for its continuance upon our statute books. On the subject of placing telegraph and telephone companies under the control of the public service commission the committee had examined the law and found that it seems to apply to corporations only, and if, under the present law, telephone companies that are unincorporated are not under the provision of the commission they should be placed there.

Regarding direct primary legislation, the grange recommended the repeal of the present primary law in toto and the enactment of such a law as will meet the demand of the advocates of genuine direct primary legislation.

Meeting of County Deputies.

The county deputies from the various counties in New York held a meeting in connection with the state grange which was attended by nearly all of them. It was the sixth annual session of the Deputies' association. J. J. Barden is president. The discussion of many subjects pertaining to the work of the deputy was interesting and valuable. Papers were read on "Grange Inspection," by E. O. Andrus of Jefferson county; on "The County Deputy and His Responsibilities," by R. R. Knapp of Cortland, and on "The Subordinate Grange—Some of Its Weaknesses and How Remedied," by Dufay Wright of Monroe. A resolution was adopted asking that the state grange allow deputies \$2.50 per day for four days and 4 cents mileage one way when attending the state grange meetings. The resolution was presented to the body of the grange for consideration.
