### BEND HAS FLOUR MILL

Big Plant Was Ready For Operation Last December.

Within a few weeks after the beginning of regular train service last fall, Bend had a flour mill in operation, the plant of the Bend Milling & Warehouse Co. starting to grind on December 17, 1911. It is located on the river and is operated by electricity.

The mill is thoroughly equipped for producing high grade products, and already these are becoming well known in Central Oregon. It has five double run of rolls, with complete sifter system. For the making of whole wheat and graham flour two stands of rolls are used, and there are also two rolls for chopping and rolling feed grain.

The machinery is driven by a 50-horsepower motor. The capacity of the mill is 150 barrels every 24 hours. In addition to various grades of flour, the mill makes breakfast foods.

The machinery is housed in a four-story building constructed of lumber and corrugated iron. The plant represents an investment of \$25,000. Warehouse Co. are: E. A. Sather, president; H. C. Ellis, vice president; V. A. Forbes, secretary; C. I. Bozell, treasurer and general manager.

### THE SUTTLES LAKE PROJECT

Irrigation Enterprise Has Promise of Prosperous Future.

An irrigation enterprise that has much promise is that of the Suttles Lake Improvement Company, a corporation with headquarters at Bend, and which plans to use the stored waters of Blue and Suttles lakes for the irrigation of 12,500 acres of fertile land. This area lies some 22 miles northwest of Bend, in the vicinity of Cline Buttes. In addition to the land for whose irrigation water rights have been obtained, there is about three times as much more land whose irrigation may be attempted later. However, whether or not water is ever put upon this territory, as a dry farm proposition its future is assured.

The first investigations of this project were made some 20 years ago by settlers on the Metolus river. In 1906 and 1907 L. D. Wiest of Bend and others took up active engineering investigation, out of which has grown the undertaking of today. In 1909, together with J. W. Howard of Lower Bridge, Mr. Wiest continued his work.
