

ALL WORK DONE BY BEND PLANT

BIG EDITION COMPLETELY PRINTED HERE

Press Work Totalled 66,500 Impressions, With Nearly Two Tons of News Print Paper Used—Linotype Set All the Type.

"You had a lot of the printing done in Portland, of course?"

Quite a few people who dropped into The Bulletin office last week said something like that when they saw the big piles of the "special" stacked in the extra room that had to be rented for the occasion.

So, just to show that Bend has a printing plant that can handle a job such as the production of this Development Number has been, The Bulletin wants to state that every line of type in the paper was set here, and every one of the 7000 copies was run off The Bulletin's press. That means a total of 66,500 impressions on the newspaper press, reckoning 14,000 for each of the five sections excepting the first, whose 12 pages required an additional 3500 run. The Bulletin's "Model Ten" Mergenthaler linotype typesetting machine set every line of the reading matter in the 80 columns of type in this edition, and some of the advertisements—there is not an inch of boiler plate in the paper. The cuts number 100. More than a ton and three-quarters of news print paper is used in the edition.

These figures do not stack up as big as they might, compared with metropolitan papers, but The Bulletin believes that very few towns in the West the size of Bend have a printing establishment capable of caring for the mechanical end of such an edition. Just as The Bulletin is sure that in no town in the West, of any size, would the merchants and others give such an enterprise a better support than The Bulletin has received from the people of Bend in this venture.

HOW TO PICK THE "CLUCKER."
Volumes have been written on how to tell the layer, but where's the hen tale on how to pick the clucker? Now, clucks are not just clucks. They are good, bad, indifferent or devilish.

The last are destructive to eggs and New Year resolutions not to swear. Mediterranean breeds and their crosses when they do sit use up eggs and the patience of the poultryman. Heavyweight hens are too clumsy and often make omelet of high priced eggs and crush chicks. Nervous, flighty hens that skyrocket off the nest at approach or spybeck

operator without provocation are not safe. Plymouth Rocks, White Wyandottes and Rhode Island Reds are about the right size and are generally so gentle and steady as brooders and mothers that they are conceded to be the experts at raising Rooseveltian fowl families. A light, weak hen should never be set. Such a hen often dies on the nest or quits before hatch is out, hatches nothing or incubates weak chickens, even from fine, strong eggs.

To bring big bon ton chicks the hen

must have requisite blood heat to warm eggs clear through. Weak hens haven't enough blood. They often break down under the ordeal. What is more, they have more lice than ordinary because they haven't ambition to fight crumblers. But hens aren't just to sit. They are to raise the chicks. This requires a good sized body and wide wing to cover them; likewise health and strength to scratch for chicks.

We have never seen an unhealthy hen raise a full nor good brood of chicks.

The mother hen here shown is perfectly tame and is the type that raises

the big bon ton bunch with little trouble to the owner.

Some will nature fake by setting chickens on turkey eggs. If that's your style use the Light Brahma for foster mother, as she does better than the ordinary chicken hen.

Let the cluck shape her own nest. She forms it oval, not round, as you would, and do not give her more than eleven to fifteen eggs, according to her size and the weather.

Don't forget that the busy bee and busy Biddy are a great combination, but that ducklings will swallow bees and—quick demise.
Don't fall to clean and renew the homer's nest when the squabs are large enough to handle and burn the old nesting material.
Don't feed an egg stimulant while your hens are in molt. People who have a good laying strain and use right methods use no stimulants.
