

### BEND MAKES GOOD SHOWING AT THE POTLACH



Bend Park Company's Booth at Seattle Last Week and Part of Sales Force.

SEATTLE, July 22.—At the big Potlatch festivities here last week, Bend was very much in the public eye. The Bend booth by day was by far the handsomest in Seattle. Decorated throughout with blue and gold, the colors of the Emblem Club, it was filled with fresh flowers, pictures, literature, exhibits of Bend products and grains and grasses; and the entire back of the booth outside was a six-foot water-color, a bird's-eye view of Bend and the mountains from the top of Pilot Butte.

By night it was even more strikingly superior to any other booth at

the Potlatch, as it carried 275 incandescent lights outside in Blue and Gold; and the entire back of the booth inside was an electric transparency of the blue and gold emblem of the Emblem Club.

Over 70,000 pieces of literature were distributed from this booth, most of them accompanied by a personal talk with the recipient by one of these Bend workers clad in the Seattle colors of white and gold, so that this immense quantity of Bend printing went to people who were actually interested in Bend. Among the great mass of discarded folders et cetera with which the streets were

littered at midnight each night, the most careful search failed to disclose any Bend folders or any Bend Bulletins. The people carried them home.

More than 1000 strangers registered their names and addresses at the booth; and more than 1000 copies of the Development Number of The Bulletin were given to them.

Spokane, Portland, Tacoma and many other towns had delegates at the Potlatch; but it is the consensus of opinion that Bend made more indelible impression on the Potlatch throngs than did all other visiting towns combined.

This is the reason for having "dog watches," which are made by dividing the hours between 4 p. m. and 8 p. m. into two watches.
