Convention Opened Last Night. At La Pine and Fort Rock preparations had been made for the entertainment of the travelers, most of whom planned to spend the night at Silver Lake.

The convention at Lakeview officially opened last night, being called to order by E. L. Britten, president of the Lakeview Commercial Club. Then followed an address of welcome by E. E. Rinehart, mayor, and a response on the part of William Hanley, President of the Development League, after which J. E. Sawhill of Bend, secretary, spoke regarding the accomplishments of the organization during its first year of work.

Today and tomorrow are occupied with an extensive program of speeches, followed by a banquet, and including several excursions to neighboring points of interest. Tomorrow occurs election of officers and the selection of headquarters for the ensuing year. It is generally understood that Klamath Falls is out

after the headquarters site, and doubtless will land it.

Pacific Highway Up. Perhaps the most important work which the convention hopes to accomplish is to arouse interest in the location of the route of the Pacific Highway east of the Cascades through Oregon instead of west of the mountains. The advantages of the eastern route will be gone over, and a campaign for the location of the road in this territory inaugurated. Already many powerful interests are enlisted on behalf of the interior.
