

WEATHER IN CROOK COUNTY IN AUGUST

Demonstration Farm Superintendent Gathering Important Data on Rain-fall and Temperature.

In arid farming the average length of growing season and the amount of and distribution of rainfall are important factors in determining the crop best adapted and the most suitable time for their seeding. To aid in gathering this important data, the agricultural demonstration work in Crook county is including the establishing of sixteen new co-operative weather observer stations to supplement those already established by the weather bureau.

Weather in Crook County for the month of August was free from extreme high temperature and was generally mild and pleasant. Three rainy periods were fairly general over the county. The first occurred August 1 to 3, the second August 15 to 17 and the third August 29 to 31. A warm spell occurred on the 23d and a cool wave the 29th. The rainfall and the maximum and minimum temperatures for the month were reported as follows:

3634 VISIT CRATER LAKE

Fund for Improvement Not Available Yet and Weather Bad.

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 8.—W. F. Arant, superintendent of Crater Lake Park, says that the appropriation for road building in the park has not yet been made available, and that little if any work can be done this season, because of the continued rains.

Notwithstanding the fact that the season was late, the snow lying on the roads until July 1, and that there has been at least twice the usual amount of rain this season, the travel to the park has been heavy. The record shows that 3635 persons had visited the lake up to September 1, and that 2496 of these made the trip during August.

If there shall follow two or three weeks of good weather, as is usual in the latter part of September, a large number will yet make the trip, as

there are several parties who planned to go about the first week in September, who were prevented by the continued bad weather, which has not yet ended.

Mr. Arant reports that \$480 has been collected from motor cars this season.

BEGIN CRUISE OF TIMBER

Party of Seven Men Will be Engaged in Work for Several Months.

Some 100,000 acres of timber lying in the Deschutes valley south of Bend will be cruised during the next two months by a party of seven men who arrived in Bend Monday night. When seen at the Hotel Bend yesterday, members of the crew said they represented James D. Lacey & Co. of Portland. They will pitch their first camp a few miles south of here, working southward for 60 miles or more before their task is completed. The timber lies mostly in disconnected tracts. The men state that they do not know what the object of the cruise at this time is.

Those in the party are W. P. King, Victor Torrey, W. A. Winkle, Theo. Brown, Leo Marlin, A. Hemann and J. F. King. They left yesterday afternoon to begin their work.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE AT FAIR
