There are in the party Mrs. Geo. E. Vincent, wife of the president of

the University of Minnesota and a number of young people including Martha Bowers, daughter of the late Attorney General; her brother, Lloyd W. J. Bowers, who recently returned from Europe, and Miss Isabelle Vincent, who was at Bryan Mawr with Miss Taft. When the party arrived at Two

Medicine Lake, Montana, the first stop in Glacier National Park, they were greeted by a band of about 200 Blackfoot Indians, whose reservation adjoins the park. The Indians entertained the party with exhibitions of their Sun Dance, Grass Dance and Medicine Lodge ceremonies. Glacier National Park is replete with Indian

legend and full of scientific interest on account of the geological formations. President Taft is setting a good example to every American citizen by introducing to his family the beauties of American scenery. The "See America First" slogan has made an impression on our chief executive.

SPELTZ FINE FOR HOGS

Crop That is New to This Section Yields Heavily. A crop that is likely to prove a very important one in Central Oregon is speltz. Those who are familiar with it say it is a tip-top food for hogs. Ed Halvorson, who raised the crop in North Dakota, sowed a small patch of it this year on his irrigated ranch a mile and a half southeast of town and says the yield has been at the rate of 50 bushels to the acre, he is sure. It is a grain something like barley and can be raised on both dry and irrigated land. Next year Mr. Halvorson expects to put in at least five acres of speltz. He reports a fine hay crop on his place. He has harvested 40 tons of

wheat hay and 5 of clover, most of the land in cultivation being new. It is irrigated from the north lateral of the Arnold canal.

WEEKLY MARKET LETTER.

NORTH PORTLAND, Sept. 14—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle, 1627; calves, 56; hogs, 1354; sheep, 4534. The market for the best grades of cattle has remained firm, some extra good steers selling as high as \$7.25 and choice heifers readily bringing \$6.50 to \$6.60. Supplies continue to be inadequate to the demand and prospects are good for continued high prices. The hog division had a widely diversified range, sales ranging from \$8.50 to \$9.30 according to quality. Best well finished swine, however, were in good demand at from \$9.20 to \$10.30. Receipts show a slight increase over last week's but buyers

are still far from being well supplied. Mutton continues to advance, best wethers now selling at \$4.65, ewes at \$3.85 and lambs from \$5.50 to \$6.65. Light receipts in this division continue to prevail.

WATERLOO MAN BUYS HERE

R. A. Coates, a business man of Waterloo, Iowa, was in Bend last week and purchased through J. A. Eastes a tract of about eight acres in Pilot Butte Heights, owned by J. H. Bean. Mr. Coates said he would bring his family out next spring. He represented a number of friends living in Waterloo and they will probably, on his favorable recommendation, buy the whole tract of some 20 acres. It is located within two miles of town and is good land. Adjoining it is the farm of Joe Buckholz, who made such a big success raising truck.
