PRESENTS GIFT TO MRS. SMITH

President of Library Organization Has Done Much to Bring it to Present Efficient State.

Statement of Finances.

As an expression of their appreciation of the services of Mrs. F. F. Smith, president of the Library Club for the past three and a half years, the members presented her with a cut glass jardinier. Mrs. Smith is leaving Bend in a few days to reside in Portland.

In a very large measure the Library Club's present state of great efficiency in the civic life of the city today is due to the untiring work of its president. When Mrs. Smith was chosen to fill that position, the club was small in membership, with enthusiasm even at a lower ebb.

With commendable tact and much hard work, Mrs. Smith kept the club going, until today it is one of the best organizations Bend has. Back in the early days of Mrs. Smith's presidency, the club did not even have a secretary or tressurer and all the official duties devolved on the president; and as showing the work that was necessary to be done then, it may be said that even dish-washing, after an ice cream social or other entertainment was given for the purpose of raising funds, was a part of the presidential duties.

Club's Financial Standing. A statement of the finances of the club, as prepared by the secretary-treasurer, Mrs. P. W. Brown, shows that the club is now on a thriving basis. The club owns the library building, which cost \$456. Of this amount \$60.85 was donated in ma-The building itself was given by the Deschutes Investment Company, and J. W. Dimick, L. C. Fleming, George Brosterhous and H. D. Bourcy contributed labor. The material was donated as follows: Hend Herman Jacobson died, intestate. Company, \$50; Skuse Hardware Company, \$6.35; Overturf-Davis-Miller Company.\$4.50

The club has on hand \$70.15 in There was a balance from August of \$97.90, and during the month the receipts have been \$18.30. The September expenditures have salary, printing, wiring of building, new books, etc. The club has \$25 in bills receivable.

The indebtedness of the club is First National Bank, which charges no interest on the loan. Of this amount \$170 is for having the library building moved from the corner of Hond and Oregon streets to its present site, and \$87.55 for cash advanced for labor.

All the ladies of the club take great interest in its work and devote much of their time and energies to it, and along with Mrs. Smith they all deserve much credit for fostering such an important asset of the town.

Shut Up Your Dog When These Symptoms Begin to Show.

The first striking symptom in a rabid dog is almost invariably a decided change in its disposition. It either hecomes more cross, irritable and sulky or shows opposed friendliness wants to be continually petted. Ob viously in the latter state it is a most dangerous menace to its owner, who easily may be infected through a scratch on the hand or by a bite during unusual playfulness. In either case the dog soon becomes extremely restless, lying down, then almost immediately getting up to run around pervously for a few seconds and again lying down. This rotation it keeps up without interruption for some time The dog is easily startled, growis and barks at the least provocation. The owner or keeper who knows its disposition will easily discern this change and by simply shutting up the dog serurely for observation will obviate all

It will prevent the development of the disease if administered properly and if used in time. The report of the Pasteur institute of Paris (Annales de l'Institut Pasteur, states that during the past ten years 7,380 persons have been treated, of whom only twentyone have died from all causes, a mortality of 28 per cent. The record in this country is almost as good.-Walter Peet in Harper's Weekly.
