

# RESIDENCE TO BE OF STONE

A. L. FRENCH BUILDING IN DESCHUTES

Eight-Room House Will be First Home Constructed of Stone in Bend—Work Already Begun. Cost Will be Four Thousand.

To A. L. French goes the distinction of being the first builder of a stone residence in Bend. Work is now under way on a building which will be one of the handsomest homes in the city. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$4000 and will be ready to move into probably about February 1.

It will be a two-story structure, with eight rooms besides pantry, closets, bath rooms, etc. The dimensions are 50 by 42 feet. Bates & Beaver have the stone contract.

Local pink or gray stone quarried just west of the river is being used, with trimmings of black and brown. The window sills and the lintels will be black and the other trimmings brown, giving the residence a handsome appearance. Mr. French will have a lot of porch room, the roof projecting over the porch. Thirty-four thousand shingles will be used.

The inside finishing will all be of first class fir, and a feature of the living room will be a big fireplace built of stone and lined with brick.

The house is located on lots 7 and 8, block 20, Deschutes addition. The property was purchased recently from Karl Ladewig. Mr. French at present occupies his own home on Cascade avenue, in Deschutes.

## MUST EDUCATE PEOPLE IN MATTER OF GOOD ROADS.

Thomas Nelson Page Tells of Benefits of the Movement.

"Of all the material affairs of the country at present," says Thomas Nelson Page, the author, "the improvement of the public roads seems to me the most important and far-reaching. Every improvement of our roads is a direct increase in the value of our property and a direct assistance toward the improvement, physically, morally and mentally, of our people. It is not too much to say that in the southern portion of this country we are fifty years behind at least a part of the north in this matter of roads, and we are 200 years behind Europe, at least that portion of Europe over which I have traveled, extending from the northern fords of Norway down to the southernmost points of Italy and Spain.

"Our people need to be educated in this matter of good roads as much as on any other matter in the world.

"It takes a long time to establish a new idea in the minds of a great conservative population, but this new idea is taking root among our people and will in time become established. The new idea of farming is being introduced, which is already increasing materially the productivity of the soil and the knowledge of our farming population as to the value of improved methods, and it is as certain as any other law of nature that in time the improvement of the public roads will come. The only question is whether we shall allow this improvement to be postponed until our generation are all dead and buried or whether we shall bring this improvement in our own time and get the benefits of it—whether we shall use our knowledge and our opportunities to give to the rising generation throughout the country the benefits which come directly from a great system of good roads opening the way to enlightenment and comfort of all kinds or whether we shall leave them to suffer from the want of such a system and possibly even from the want of knowledge that such improvement is essential."

## MRS. WOODROW WILSON.

Wife of the Democratic Presidential Nominee. Honorary President of the Woman's National Democratic League.



Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, wife of the new leader of Democracy and probable next mistress of the White House, is perhaps the most interesting woman in the United States today. This is inevitable—not because she wishes it, for she does not—and is as firm as a rock in her conviction that being the wife of a public man does not necessitate nor call for a woman's becoming a publicity seeker. She successfully resisted all appeals of photographers and interviewers until Mr. Wilson's nomination as Democratic candidate for the presidency was an fait accompli. This modesty is easily traced to her southern ancestry and training and is characteristic also of her distinguished husband.

She was born Ellen Louise Axson, daughter of a Presbyterian divine of Savannah, Ga., whose family, so far as he knows, is the only one of the name in America.

Like Mr. Wilson, she has one brother and one sister living, all in the same literary circle as the doctor and herself.

In this atmosphere of learning Mrs. Wilson could hardly be expected to be other than she is—widely read, broadminded and charitable, devoted to her home and the principles for which it stands.

She has marked ability as an artist, and it is said that a portrait painter of ability was spoiled when she married the young barrister who had then given up the practice of his profession to specialize on the subject that has made him a presidential nominee.

Mrs. Wilson's three daughters—Misses Margaret Woodrow Wilson, Jessie Woodrow Wilson and Eleanor Randolph Wilson—possess the mental characteristics of their father and their mother's artistic temperament, combined in such a way as to give zest to every moment of their lives and protection from the follies of the world. They form, indeed, an ideal family circle, one that it would be well for every American household to emulate.

The Women's National Democratic League, of which Mrs. Woodrow Wilson and Mrs. Thomas R. Marshall, wives of the leading Democratic candidates, are honorary president and honorary vice president respectively and Mrs. John S. Crosby is president, has opened headquarters at 1123 Broadway, New York city, in charge of the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Stephen B. Ayres, wife of Congressman Ayres of New York.

"It has not declared for or against the question of equal suffrage nor should it be expected to do so any more than it would discuss the questions of religion," said Mrs. Ayres from her post as "live wire" of the league. "We are simply good Democrats banded together for the greatest good to the greatest number of American housewives, who today are required to pay more in this country for American goods than they would have to pay for the same goods in a foreign land."

She is especially interested in the tariff on articles in constant demand and has developed into quite a speaker at the "housewife" meetings of the tariff committee of the national Democratic committee.
