RESIDENCE TO BE OF STONE

A. L. FRENCH BUILDING IN DESCHUTES

Eight-Boom House Will be First Home Constructed of Stone in Bend-Work Already Begun. Cost Will be Four Thousand.

To A. L. French goes the distinction of being the first builder of a stone residence in Bend. Work is now under way on a building which will be one of the handsomest homes in the city. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$4000 and will be ready to move into probably about l'ebruary 1.

It will be a two-story structure. with eight rooms besides pantry closets, bath rooms, etc. The di mensions are 20 by 42 feet. Bates & Beaver have the stone contract.

Local pink or gray stone quarried lust west of the river is being used, with trimmings of black and brown The window sills and the lintels will to black and the other trimmings brown, giving the residence a hand-nome appearance. Mr. French will have a lot of porch room, the roof projecting over the porches. Thirtyfour thousand shingles will be used

The inside finishing will an be of first class fir, and a feature of the living room will be a big fireplace built of stone and lined with brick. The house is located on lots 7 and

8, block 20, Deschutes addition. The property was purchased recently from Karl Ladewig. Mr. French at present occupies his own home on Cascade avenue, in Deschutes.

MUST EDUCATE PEOPLE IN MATTER OF GOOD ROADS.

Thomas Nelson Page Tells of Benefits of the Movement.

"Of all the material affairs of the country at present," says Thomas Net son Page, the anthor, "the improvement of the public roads seems to me the most important and farrenching. Every improvement of our roads is a direct tocrease in the value of our property and a direct assistance toward the improvement, physically, morally and mentally, of our people. It is not too much to say that in the southern portion of this country we are fifty years behind at least a part of the north in this matter of roads, and we are 200 years behind Europe, at least that portion of Europe over which I have traveled, extending from the northern flords of Norway down to the southernmost points of Italy and Spain

"Our people need to be educated in this matter of good roads as much as on any other matter in the world.

"It takes a long time to establish a ew idea in the minds of a great con ervative population, but this new Mor is taking root among our people and will in time become established. The new idea of farming is being introduced, which is already increasing mate rially the productivity of the soil and the knowledge of our farming popula tion as to the value of improved meth ods, and it is as certain as any other law of nature that in time the improve ment of the public roads will come. The only question is whether we shall allow this improvement to be postponed until our generation are all dead and buried or whether we shall bring this improvement in our own time and get the benefits of it-whether we shall use our knowledge and our opportunities to give to the rising generation throughout the country the benefits which come directly from a great system of good roads opening the way to culightenment and comfort of all kinds or whether we shall leave them to suffer from the want of such a system and possibly even from the want of knowledge that such improve-ment is essential."
