TWO SAWMILLS BURNED

Big Clarke Loses His Plant Located
Southeast of Town.

Last Friday night two sawmills
burned, one being Big Clark's south-
east of Bend and the other the Burk-
hard-McCord mill at Three Creeks,
in the Sisters country.

Clark's mill was put in operation
last spring and while not a first class
plant turned out considerable lum-
ber. Its capacity was 20,000 or 25,
000 feet a day. The cause of the
fire is not known. The loss is said
to be fully covered by insurance.

The owners of the Three Creek
mill had no insurance. It was the
second time within the past two
years that the plant has been burned.
