MARKET DAY AT METOLIUS FINE

R. E. KOON GETS BLUE RIBBON

Coe and McFarlane Urged to Enter Fat Man's Race, But Balk on Technicality—Enterprising New Town Sets Record

(Editorial Correspondence)

METOLIUS, Oct. 26—This evening ended the first "Market Day" in the history of Metolius, and a remarkably busy and entertaining day it has been, for this bustling new town set a notable record—a record that is the more remarkable when it is remembered that two years ago there was nothing whatever but a stubble field where Metolius now is.

There was a big crowd. Racing—horse, pony, man, boy, girl, three-legged, potato, obstacle and other varieties—formed one of the chief amusements, plus all kinds of stunts. There were liberal prizes, and many of them; also music by the Redmond band, hired for the occasion. One of the best features of the day was an agricultural exhibit, at which the showing of potatoes was one of the most remarkable yet seen in the county.

Koon a Ribbon Winner.

Bend carried off high honors. The highest honors, indeed, for R. E. Koon, the six-foot-four-and-then-some engineer, who is looking after Bend's sewer system work, was found to be the tallest man present. His sky-scaper architecture won him a blue ribbon and a check for \$2. At last reports he still had the ribbon. When the fat man's race was being prepared, backers of the two candidates made a strenuous effort to get Coe and McFarlane entered, just to try out the judgeship race in advance. But both men balked, some said because it hurt their feelings to be classed with the heavyweights, or because, others maintained, each feared the other would foul him. Judge Brink of Prineville finally won the race, beating out a big buck Indian.

POOR MAIL SERVICE.

(Salem Statesman.)

The state railroad commission on Friday received a communication from the Seattle postmaster asking why the Oregon officials do not institute a better arrangement in regard to railroad mail facilities in eastern Oregon. It appears that

Oregon Trunk and the Oregon & Washington railroads do not maintain any postal connection at the mouth of the Deschutes, and that the mail arising from Central Oregon has to be sent clear to either Seattle or Portland and then transferred, this meaning a considerable delay in shipment. The Seattle people recommend that a railroad mail station be established near the junction where the sacks may be resorted and distributed along the most expeditious route. The matter will be taken up with the roads.

OVERTURE HOME PROGRESSES.

The new residence being built by H. J. Overture in Park Addition, near the Putnam house, is rapidly nearing completion. The house has dimensions of 32 by 34 feet, and is of two stories, with a large cellar. J. J. Cunningham is the contractor.
