WOODROW WILSON ROLLS UP REMARKABLE VICTORY

Democratic Candidate Sweeps North, East, South and West

Roosevelt is Second, Taft a Poor Third

An unexpectedly large amount of crepe was hung on the political doors of Messrs. Taft and Roosevelt in yesterday's election, and even the most ardent Wilson men are wondering just how the Democratic candidate rolled up such a gigantic plurality as the reports from all sections of the country indicate are safely tabulated for him.

Wilson will win, by a handsome plurality, in every state excepting possibly seven. Partial returns give Taft a chance to win out in New Hampshire. Vermont is probably Taft's. Rhode Island belongs to the president, and in Michigan returns show a close race. Roosevelt undoubtedly wins Illinois, although Wilson carried Chicago. Washington is in the brief Roosevelt column, as is Idaho, apparently by a good plurality. South Dakota is not clinched for Wilson, though probably his, with the Colonel second. Pennsylvania is being battled for by Wilson and Roosevelt. The Philadelphia "North American" claims the state for Roosevelt.

With very few exceptions Taft was a poor third. Roosevelt managers concede all eastern states to Wilson. New York probably gives Wilson more than 250,000 plurality, with indications that the Democrat got more votes than his two opponents combined. Taft appears to be second in the Empire state. The south went solid for Wilson, with tremendous pluralities. Virginia probably

gives 40,000; in Georgia he received the largest majority ever pulled in a presidential contest. In Boston Wilson got as many votes as the others combined. Wilson carries Ohio, in 1908 Taft led with 55,000.

A further Democratic victory is assured in many states where governors and other officers are up for election. In Massachusetts Foss, the Democrat, seems slated for the governorship, with Dunne in Illinois and Sulzer in New York. Both the New York assembly and senate are to be Democratic. "Uncle Joe" Cannon is probably defeated.

In Washington state the Democrats claim victory for Lister, their gubernatorial candidate. In New Jersey 10 of 12 congressmen are Democrats. Wisconsin will have a Democratic governor.

OREGON APPARENTLY JOINS THE WILSON BANDWAGON

Lane and Selling Running Neck and Neck—No Single Tax—Women May Vote—Sinnott to Congress.

Portland, 3 p. m.—Oregon almost surely has taken a place in the long line of Wilson states. Roosevelt holds second place. The long ballot made voting slow and holds back the returns.

Lane and Selling are running neck and neck. Bourne is well out of the race, although he seems to have polled slightly the best vote in Multnomah county.

All indications point to the success of the equal suffrage amendment.

Single tax is defeated, and it is thought that a similar fate awaits the graduate tax measure. It is stated here that several important announcements concerning development enterprise throughout the state, notably in timber, will be made now. These, it is understood, were held up pending the vote on the single tax measure.

Lafferty goes to congress again from this district. The first district seems closely divided between Hawley and Smith, with the odds favoring the former. Sinnott is far ahead of Graham in the third.

Sixty-three precincts just in give Wilson 2010, Taft 1481 and Roosevelt 1293. Last scattered returns shows Selling in lead of Lane.

SPRINGER TO BE COUNTY JUDGE

BREWSTER BEATEN BY FRED RICE

Returns From About Four-Fifths of County, While Showing Two Close Races, Are Regarded as the Final Results.

With practically complete returns from 24 of Crook county's 37 precincts, those not yet heard from polling but a very small portion of the total vote, the results in the county, as follows, are practically sure:

Final returns are expected to make very little difference in the standing of the candidates, as easily 85 per cent of the vote is recorded. On final returns from Bend and from the few eastern precincts there is possibility of Foster yet winning over Van Allen.

Lane Ahead in County.
 Lane carries the county for Senator, with 451 votes in 18 precincts. Bourne gets 219 and Selling 401. Sinnott runs ahead of Graham for Congress by 642 votes to 397. Bell is elected district attorney, it seems. He carries the county with 679 votes in 18 precincts, against 536 for Allen. V. A. Forbes of Bend is elected state representative easily.

Woman is Defeated.
 The first woman candidate to seek political office, Mrs. Della W. Nichols of Laidlaw, went down to defeat for school superintendent. In 18 precincts she polled 416 votes against 988 for Myers.
 While practically no full returns are yet obtainable in the county on the initiative and other measures, returns from Redmond, La Pine, Deschutes, Laidlaw and Bend precincts show that equal suffrage leads about 3 to 2 and single tax is opposed in about the same ratio throughout the county.
Complete Returns Next Week.
 Next week The Bulletin will publish a complete tabulation of the vote of all Crook County precincts, with official count.

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
