

## NORTH CANAL WORK GOES ON

### UNFORESEEN OBSTACLES HINDER

Project Will be Ready for Next Irrigation Season, Reclaiming Many Acres of Land—Central Oregon Irrigation Co. in Charge.

Reports to the contrary notwithstanding, work continues on the North Canal dam, some 75 men being employed there now. The construction of the big project is now in charge of the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. officials, L. F. Gerdtz having given up the contract last Friday noon.

Construction has been considerably delayed on the dam and canal, by unforeseen obstacles, but those in charge of the work say that they expect to complete it for use by January 1st.

The biggest part of the most difficult features of the work have been completed. The huge dam across the stream yet requires some concrete and other work. On the canal itself most of the concrete lining is in where excavation has been made. Just now men are blasting through the rock to connect the canal with the headgate, the only canal excavation remaining, which will be completed by Nov. 12. The concrete work at the headgate is in.

A pool or head bay is being built just below the dam, on the east side, through which will pass the water for the Swalley flume.

Work on this project was started in April and it was expected to have it completed by September 1. However, various obstacles not calculated on at first came up. With the exception of the finishing touches, the undertaking will be completed this winter. Next spring water will be turned into the canal, and a largely increased acreage of land in this county brought under irrigation.

### MOVE TO NEW QUARTERS

Office Men Now Located in Stone Building.

The present week is "moving week" for many Bend office men, for the rapidly approaching completion of the several new office buildings. Tenants are going in upstairs at the new First National Bank building and in the Sather building. Before the end of the month the bank itself will move.

Dr. Coe expects to move during the week. Hunter & Staats Sather building, where Dr. F. H. Thompson now has his office also.
